

# From the Vicarage



As I sit looking out of the Study window I can see that once again the grass needs cutting. Some things don't

change no matter how much the world is changing around them. When I first started here in May 2001 I was amazed at the number of times the grass needed cutting and I will end my time here still having to cut the grass up to the last week. There seems so much to do at the moment in getting ready to leave. Arranging for all the final bills for telephone and electricity, moving the furniture over to Leek and getting rid of the things we never got round to unpacking from the last move. As if this were not enough there is that wedding to prepare for.

There is always a danger at times like these that we get so wrapped up in the organisation that we lose sight of what's going on around us. I think to some extent the church itself is guilty of this at the moment. Our leaders seem so concerned with what they consider burning issues of doctrine that they have taken their eye off the ball of what is going on around them. Why I ask myself is the Anglican Communion tearing itself apart over homosexuality when millions around the world are going hungry.

In a few weeks your representatives will be involved in planning the Parish Profile which sets out to give a picture of Parish life to anyone who is interested in applying for the living here. They will also need to give an indication of the type of person that they are looking for and what they consider the priorities for a new ministry will be. The PCCs will also be voting on whether to accept applications from women as well as men.

I have read a number of profiles over the years and I have yet to see one that lists as a priority a candidate's view on the Ordination of Women Bishops or asks for their views on homosexuality. Usually parishes are concerned with a person's ability to teach the word of God and their performance in the pulpit. Some put a high value on team work where others are looking for a strong leader.

Jesus time and time again reminded the Pharisees that God was least concerned with the accuracy of a person's interpretation of the Law of Moses than he was by their ability to care for the needs of others. Remember the parable of the Good Samaritan? An open and welcoming nature is a greater witness to the Gospel than in depth knowledge of Canon Law.

I will remember with joy much of my time here in the Moolands. I have very much enjoyed working with the three schools. I have loved meeting so many friendly people. I have learnt a great deal about myself and where God is leading me and I am now looking forward to my next phase of ministry back in the Classroom teaching and encouraging young people not only to learn mathematics but to learn how to care for each other.

I will continue to pray for each parish and for your next incumbent. I will pray also for your church wardens and PCCs who will carry on the work of the benefice in the absence of a Vicar. They will need your support and encouragement in the months ahead. I hope to see many of you at the Wedding Service at St. Luke's on the 5<sup>th</sup> September at 2pm and no doubt we will continue to bump into each other.

# From the Readership

**August** is the eighth month of the year in the Gregorian Calendar and one of seven Gregorian months with the length of 31 days. August begins (astrologically) with the sun in the sign of Leo and ends in the sign of Virgo. Astronomically speaking, the sun begins in the constellation of Cancer and ends in the constellation of Leo.

This month was originally named *Sextilis* in Latin, because it was the sixth month in the ancient Roman calendar, which started in March about 750 BC under Romulus. It became the eighth month either when January and February were added to the beginning of the year by King Numa Pompilius about 700 BC or when those two months were moved from the end to the beginning of the year by the decemvirs about 450 BC (Roman writers disagree). It was renamed in honor of Augustus in 8 BC because several of the most significant events in his rise to power, culminating in the fall of Alexandria, which fell in this month. Lore claims August originally had 29 days in the Roman Republican calendar. Augustus took two days from February and gave it to August when Sextilis was renamed in his honor.


August's flower is the gladiolus or poppy, and its birthstone is the peridot.

If this war has done any good it is in that it has helped to revive charitable feeling, sympathy for suffering, unselfishness and love. That it has done harm is also true, or else facts are altogether wrong. What else will account for the decline in attendance at Church and Chapel according to this year's returns. Causes no doubt are numerous, but much is

attributable to those changeable feelings of mind and heart which a state of War brings with it. Whatever the cause, loud and clear should be our cry to the Almighty: "O God stretch out Thy mighty hand. Defend our land, bless our just cause. The way of the ungodly Thou wilt turn upside down." Then justify the prayer by practising godliness, attending God's Prayer House and Sacraments.

**A Weekday Page for Women**  
**Saturday's Children**

*To strengthen the heels* of children's socks, when knitting the heel strap, on the plain side, knit one, slip one to the end of the row, purl back in the usual way; third row. Slip one, knit one all along, then purl back. Complete the heel strip in this way and continue the pattern while turning the heel. This gives added strength without bulk, and the heels will not need mending

for a long time.—Miss E. M. HARDING.

*Ink stain.*—For ink stains on flannel trousers use chlorophyll tooth paste. Spread paste thickly on stains, leave to dry and then sponge off.—Mrs. Evans.

# From the Diocese

## Ad Clerum from the Bishop of Lichfield - The General Synod and Women Bishops

### What happened?

On Monday, 7th July, the last full day at York, the General Synod spent many hours debating women bishops. Beforehand, there were mixed discussion groups where those who welcomed the prospect of women bishops and those who were against could listen carefully and reach out in respect and affection to one another. This proved excellent preparation for the debate, and the first few hours passed with good humour. Several spokesmen for those against the consecration of women bishops said that they recognized that it was bound to happen and simply asked that the majority make proper provision for them.

The Synod swiftly dismissed the idea that those who were against should be squeezed out of the Church and with it a simple, single clause motion, tempting though that was to many of us who believed we had waited long enough for women to be able to called to the episcopate. We also voted against detailed amendments that might tie the hands of the drafting committee too closely. Speaker after speaker affirmed that we must square the circle: we must move towards having women bishops but equally there must be proper protection for those with conscientious objections so that they can continue in their honoured place in our church.

People insisted on votes by houses on just about every amendment. This meant that, in spite of the new electronic voting equipment, the debates dragged out and

there were some very close votes. Towards 10 pm there was a change of mood which I failed to see coming and was surprised by. The Catholic group had been pretty gentle in its arguments all through the day but, unnoticed by me and I guess most others, had put its hopes into particular amendments that failed to win general approval. Some felt they were being railroaded by a ruthless group of progressives. In moments of high drama the Bishop of Durham tried, and failed, to adjourn the debate. Another Bishop said he was ashamed of the way we were treating the minority (though I couldn't understand exactly why) and some of them were very grateful for his intervention. Eventually, with bags under our eyes, we came to vote and, as is our custom, we received the result in silence.

### What was decided?

*That this Synod:*

- (a) affirm that the wish of its majority is for women to be admitted to the episcopate;*
- (b) affirm its view that special arrangements be available, within the existing structures of the Church of England, for those who as a matter of theological conviction will not be able to receive the ministry of women as bishops or priests;*
- (c) affirm that these should be contained in a statutory national code of practice to which all*

*concerned would be required to have regard; and*

*(d) instruct the legislative drafting group, in consultation with the House of Bishops, to complete its work accordingly, including preparing the first draft of a code of practice, so that the Business Committee can include first consideration of the draft legislation in the agenda for the February 2009 group of sessions.*

**House of Bishops:** For 28, Against 12, Abstentions 1

**House of Clergy:** For 124, Against 44, Abstentions 4

**House of Laity:** For 111, Against 68, Abstentions 2

So there was a comfortable majority in favour of the amendment in all three houses, but not a two-thirds majority in the House of Laity which will eventually be required.

### **What happens now?**

Nothing for quite some time. The legislative group (which contains people of all views) is tasked to produce some worked examples to see if it is possible to square the circle and to report back to the Synod in February. There will then be a further consultation and the final vote to allow women bishops is unlikely to happen until the last meeting of the Synod in 2010 at the earliest. At that point it may well fail to win a 2/3 majority in all three houses, in which case everything stops.

So there is everything to play for, and much to pray for. In the meantime I have

learned that there will be groups of clergy in this diocese who will be considerably upset by the latest developments. The clergy in petitioning and resolution parishes and the clergy in Reform include some of the most devoted in the diocese and they work in some of the poorest parishes in the land. I and my fellow bishops are committed to supporting them and to doing all we can to ensure that, though they are a minority, they continue to have an honoured place in the diocese. We are fortunate in our flying bishop, the Bishop of Ebbsfleet and will continue to work with him in providing help and support to all the parishes which look to him.

We will be contacting those clergy who, we believe, will be particularly upset by the vote but, in case the Lambeth conference intervenes and you need to talk to one or other of us, please do not hesitate to get in touch. We have learned much in working together over the past 15 years and God has not finished with us yet.

### **Emergency Planning and Faith Communities**

The government's emergency planning guidance around the flu pandemic and civil resilience are now available. The government recognises that at times of crisis faith communities have a role to play in terms of victim support. They say: "Large scale fatalities raise specific issues for faith communities that need to be addressed. Strong leadership from faith communities has a key role to play when large scale incidents trigger concerns about social cohesion."

Two documents are available. The first is intended to help emergency planners and faith communities. It deals with principles and provides tools and a roadmap for good practice. Worst case predictions may never materialise. Nevertheless, this document is intended as an encouragement to those within statutory services and faith communities. It can be downloaded from

Rites on the Way Out takes place on Thursday 9th October from 9.45am to 3.15pm at Birmingham Cathedral, with the Revd Canon Anne Horton, parish priest, author of 'Funerals' in the Using Common Worship series and member of the Praxis Council; and Hilary Al Rasheed, community business manager for Dignity Funerals in Gloucestershire and lecturer on death care and bereavement to professional organisations. She approaches her work from a perspective of Christian principles.

Course organisers say: "This day is an opportunity to explore the vision behind the Common Worship funeral provision, which, used to the full, can challenge us to restructure our thinking about travelling through dying and death. There are a number of liturgies and services for use with the dying and the bereaved. But how many of us actually use all these resources to the full, let alone understand why they are included?

"In the company of those who have begun to use these ritual stepping stones and found them helpful, we will explore how the various pastoral possibilities can assist the journey through death, both for us and for the people with whom we minister. The day is intended for clergy, lay ministers and all who have a pastoral concern for the dying and the bereaved. Funeral Directors are encouraged to attend, since they, with us, are a part of this journey. Why not invite your local Funeral Director as well as your ministry team members to come with you?"
