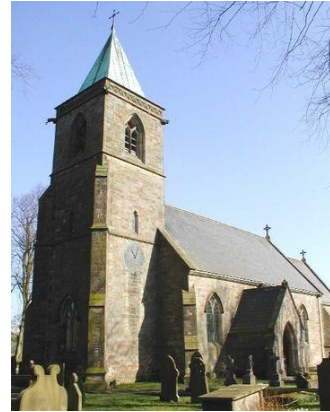

From the Vicarage

Dear Friends,

As I write, we have just returned from a holiday near St. David's, in the South West of Wales. We were away for two Sundays, and attended two very different services. The first Sunday we went to St. David's Cathedral for their morning service. Apart from the fact that the words of the service were slightly different from the ones we use (the Church in Wales has its own Service Book), it all seemed quite familiar. But there was one rather surprising feature, to do with the architecture of the church rather than the form of service; the floor of the cathedral has a very definite slope on it. (We were told that this was something to do with incorporating an old chapel into the cathedral.) I have to say that it felt quite strange to go forward for communion and have to walk uphill!

Later, I wondered why it felt odd. Very few places are naturally level, but we are used to our buildings having flat floors and vertical walls; we like to impose order on things. I am sure that the regular worshippers in the cathedral are so used to the building that they no longer notice the oddity, but perhaps it is no bad thing occasionally for us to have our sense of order and tidiness challenged when we go the house of God, and maybe it does help to have to walk uphill in order to draw near to God as we receive the bread and wine, as it may help to remind us that God is higher and greater and different from us.

On the second Sunday we were in Oxford, sharing in a service with our daughter and son-in-law and the church they attend, which was completely different again. They are part of a Christian group, sponsored by the Church of England, called MayBe, itself

part of a network of new Christian groups called 'Fresh Expressions'. They have no building, and the Minister who started the group left recently and has not been replaced, so the community meet in homes, or in the open air, or, as on Sunday, in a borrowed church building. Their services are very informal, with lots of people contributing, and with what they call 'improvisation' in the place of a sermon. (I did not tell them that it is not unusual for sermons to be improvised!). Sunday's service was more formal, because it was our granddaughter's baptism, and as I was there, they were also able to have a service of Holy Communion.

Emma and John's experience with MayBe reminds me that a key part of every church is people meeting and sharing together in their journeying with God. Because they do not have a building to maintain, some of the pressures that beset more traditional churches are absent, and they are freer to work differently. That can be an advantage, though a church building can also be a positive and attractive feature with important links to the local community. But my experience on that Sunday reminded me that the church has to be flexible in its approach if it is to reach different groups of people. For example, because they are mostly young adults, they can use texts on their mobile phones to remind them when and where the service will be; that would be more difficult in Longnor!

Those two experiences reminded me of the importance of being flexible in the way we worship God, and the power and attraction of a loving community.

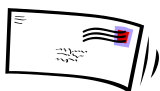

Your Rural Police News - August 2010

Over the last few weeks there have been some changes to staffing on the rural patch. Pc Brian Millward retired having completed thirty years service, his last five years being at Waterhouses. He has been replaced by another experienced officer, Pc Paul Bolam who has previously specialised on the rural beat in the Moorlands.

The area covered by officers based at Waterhouses has been increased but two more officers have joined the team. We now have a total of five staff. We hope this will help provide a more regular visible uniform presence to the residents we serve. For details of all officers see below.

During the summer break there will no doubt be an increase in visitors to our area. Most people will be law abiding and come to enjoy the countryside but a minority may visit to take advantage of the extra numbers of vehicles and other opportunities to commit theft.

Criminals don't discriminate between visitors and locals so take extra care to ensure vehicles are secured properly and valuable property isn't left in view in your vehicle or outside your home. Don't make it easy for them.

Apricots with honey

County Archives Seek Stories of Wartime Evacuation

Wartime evacuees to Staffordshire and local people with memories of evacuees during World War Two are being invited to attend a reminiscence event that will help museum and archive staff to create a lasting record of this important episode in our past.

The event takes place at Kidsgrove Library on Thursday 8 July from 3pm until 5pm. The project team will be on hand to listen to local people's stories, and their contributions will help to form part of a growing archive of evacuation in the county.

For local people with more detailed stories to tell, further in-depth interviews will be arranged and these will help to provide a learning resource for future generations.

More about the project

Children on the Move is a new project working over the next 18 months to document the county's experience of evacuation during World War 2.

70 years ago, the people of Staffordshire played their part in the biggest domestic mass movement of people in the history of the United Kingdom. The early months of the Second World War saw 3,000,000 people evacuated from vulnerable towns and cities to parts of the country considered to be safer. Many of these were school children and a number came to the towns

and rural villages of Staffordshire, from Kent and from cities such as London, Manchester and Liverpool. We know very little about how this momentous event affected people personally and how it impacted upon Staffordshire's communities.

This is a participative, reminiscence project to enable and encourage people to record their memories of children's evacuation to Staffordshire and Stoke on Trent during World War II. The project will gather information from former evacuees and also from people, who were living at that time in the communities to which children were evacuated. It will also explore how these communities coped with the sudden influx of large numbers of evacuees at a time of national emergency.

The project is a partnership between Staffordshire and Stoke-on-Trent Archive

Service, Staffordshire Arts and Museums Service, and is supported by Staffordshire University, it will run until December 2011.

Children on the Move is supported by the National Lottery through the Heritage Lottery Fund.

From the Manse

Dear Friends,

Today has been a special day. It's rained, not just a short shower but a steady wetting rain for several hours. I'm sure it won't have been enough but our farmers and gardeners will have been glad of it.

Water is a gift we tend to take for granted, yet in many parts of the world it is the most vital of resources. When I was travelling in Eastern Turkey last year, I was aware of the intention to dam many of the rivers that flow south into Syria and Iraq, to the great concern of those countries. In Egypt, too, there is great anxiety about the intention of the nations through which the Nile flows to erect dams there, too.

Water has become a political issue and it's been suggested that the conflicts of the 21st century may be over water more than anything else!

Without water there is no life. Water was necessary for the first life-forms to come into being and it's always been necessary for our survival. It's little wonder that the Bible, written in a land where water was precious, should so often speak of this vital fluid.

The woman at the well in Samaria, from whom Jesus requests a drink, hears him speaking to her about a source of "living water". As the conversation develops it becomes clear that Jesus is speaking about a gift of God, his Spirit, present and active in the lives of those who have faith, who are open to the presence of the holy.

Yet many people also know how it feels when the joy of life has dried up. In Psalm 63 the poet writes:

O God, you are my God, I seek you,
my soul thirsts for you;
my flesh faints for you,
as in a dry and weary land
where there is no water.

Within many people there are times of dryness, the feeling that there must be more to life or the awareness of having lost a liveliness they once possessed.

Christians, like others, can know times of dryness. Sometimes when life has dealt us a rough hand, when belief is hard and brings no joy, or when our creativity seems to dry up - it feels as though we are living in a parched land.

Yet, we read in the Bible the promise that the rains will come to those who wait for them. There will be streams of living water in our lives. So, when life is dry, we are encouraged to wait with patience and in confident hope for God to refresh us.

Part of what Christians have to offer the world is our story of how God has given us "living water". Our tale may not be dramatic - but it is our personal tale about the God who refreshes us with his Spirit, even in the midst of life's troubles and challenges, and it's a story worth sharing!

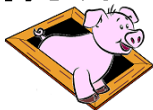
