


Worship Leader's Letter

This month I have dipped into my store of cuttings and articles. The one below was written by a former Bishop of Derby.

“Welcome, welcome!”

“It will seem like all hell has broken loose sun, moon, stars, earth, sea, in an uproar and everyone all over the world in a panic, the wind knocked out of them by the threat of doom, the powers-that-be quaking. And then ... then!

they'll see the Son of Man welcomed in grand style ... a glorious welcome! When all this starts to happen, up on your feet. Stand tall with your heads high. Help is on the way!”

These words of Jesus from Luke's Gospel (21:25-28) are found in the bible translation 'The Message'. This, and a number of similar bible passages will be read at services during this season of Advent. Advent is a Latin word meaning *coming* or *arrival*. It is a time of expectation, of waiting for *someone* or something to come. Luke paints a number of word pictures containing strange happenings that are to be revealed one day. This one provides a frightening drama — planets and the natural world all in chaos. In Jesus' time these symbols all had a meaning. Stars represented tyranny; the sun and moon symbolised rulers and empires. Each of these represented powers that seek to control human affairs.

Jesus told his followers to stand tall and hold their heads high because help is on

the way. The powers will be shaken, and he added that many with him at that moment would not die until they saw all these things come about. It is often understood that Jesus was referring to his own death, when, for his closest friends, the world seemed to be falling apart. Indeed, the Roman soldiers, Jewish authorities, the powers, also were witnesses to the end of an old order. Christ on the cross triumphed over all the violence and cruelty of the world.

Christians in every age and place never fail to have these images at their heart when the world appears shaken. And this is certainly true in our own time as we continue to come to terms with continuing acts of terror and other serious instabilities in the world at large. We yearn for the coming of the reign of Christ, the Prince of Peace. We strive as God's people to join others in shaking the powers of injustice and cruelty. We consider how all Christians can be a sign of hope and solidarity with the poor. At the same time in the midst of this yearning, striving and questioning, we will come to celebrate the birth of Jesus and welcome him anew as the hope of all humanity and the joy of the Church. God is indeed with us. In the midst of chaos we are enabled to stand tall, with heads held high.

- 1, All information is sent to Lynda by the 20th of each month.
- 2, Lynda then puts it into the magazine format which you receive.
- 3, It is then emailed to Pam so it can be proof read and the master copy is printed.
- 4, Volunteers then meet at the vicarage where 330 copies of each page are printed.
- 5, Then the magazine is collated and stapled together by volunteers.
- 6, The magazine is then counted and put into village groups and distributed to the people who then deliver it to your home.

When we had a vicar he did everything from point 3 onwards so now to be able to continue with the magazine we need volunteers to come to the vicarage for 2 to 3 hours once a month to carry out points 4,5 and 6. Your Rural Police News

You may have recently seen reports in the local press about 'bogus official' incidents that occurred in Waterhouses and Leek.

I want to pass on some advice to dramatically reduce your chance of being a victim of this particularly cold hearted crime which tends to target the most vulnerable in our society.

Bogus officials/distraction burglars often pretend they are:

- from the water board dealing with leaks, burst pipes or flooding
- from the local council, but have forgotten identification
- sales people
- gas or electric officials
- builders, claiming that the roof needs fixing.

When someone comes to your door, as a general precaution, please follow these simple steps. This advice could stop you from letting a bogus caller into your home:

- Look out of the window or use the spy hole if you have one, to see if you can identify who the caller is.
- If there is more than one person, be suspicious, it is unusual for a company to send more than one person.
- Genuine callers will normally make an appointment first and will carry identification with their photographs attached.
- If you are unsure or have any concerns, do not open the door, phone the police on **999**
- Remember that a genuine caller will not mind if you carry out these precautionary measures.



I would urge you to be vigilant and assist any vulnerable neighbours who have visitors that raise your suspicions.

There are packs with more detailed information surrounding bogus callers and dealing with doorstep sellers available at the village shops in Hulme End and Butterton. If not for yourself, please pick one up for someone you think might benefit.

If you need any further advice on Policing issues contact myself Pc Andy Beresford or one of my other colleagues at Waterhouses; Pc Brian Millward and PCSO Paul Flowers.

For non-emergency matters contact us on **0300 123 44 55** asking for your local officers.

If I'm not in the office you can leave me a voicemail message. I check this every duty day. You can also email me on andrew.beresford@staffordshire.pnn.police.uk

In the event of an emergency you should always ring 999 and even if there are no Waterhouses officers available there is continual 24/7 cover from one of our neighbouring stations.

The War has ended *victoriously*.

Soon after eleven o'clock on Nov. 11th, the news of the signing of the Armistice was telephoned to us.

Promptly the bells rang out. The church Tower was mounted and the British Flag flew mast high, to be seen miles away. A short, well-attended Service at 7 p.m.; a volume of heartfelt meaning swelling

upward as voices sang the well known hymns 165, 166, 379 (A. & M.). An earnest prayer by the Vicar, Psalm 46, a few words and the National Anthem. Flags in many windows. However, sickness was prevalent, and the Education Department has deemed it best to close both Longnor and Hollinsclough School till Dec. 2nd. One set of patients recover and again others are laid on one side. The trouble can only be described as varied forms of Influenza.
