

From the Vicarage



May I begin by wishing you all a very Happy New Year from all the family. It seems that 2008 is going to be a year of great changes for us. There is already the scent of an engagement in the air and by the time you read this it might be official. Helena will be sitting her A Levels in June and is then off to University. As a consequence ours is going to seem a very empty household; and of course these are just the changes that we know about. As we

stand on the brink of a New Year who knows what other events await us?

In the second half of the second chapter of the Gospel of St. Luke we read of the naming and circumcision of Jesus He was just eight days old when this took place and marks a great change in the life of Mary and Joseph. Instead of only having themselves to consider they now have a child who needs their constant attention. They also need to follow the law on its upbringing. So why do the Jews Circumcise their male children?

Brit Milah, or circumcision, is performed on a Jewish male eight days after he is born. The procedure is performed by a *mohel* -- a person who has mastered the set of Jewish laws regarding circumcision and received extensive practical training. At a *Brit Milah*, the *mohel* removes the baby's foreskin and draws blood from the reproductive organ, after which the baby is given a Jewish name. *Brit Milah* literally means "covenant of circumcision." Abraham, Judaism's founding father, was the first person in history to have a *Brit Milah*. In fact, he circumcised himself. Abraham vowed that he would teach his descendents to serve God with perfect devotion. In return, God promised to guarantee the survival of Abraham's progeny -- the family of Hebrews that became the nation of Israel that have since been known as the Jews. As long as there would be human beings in the world, God assured Abraham, there would always be Jews. This covenant or pact between God and Abraham was sealed through the act of circumcision. Today, by performing the act of circumcision, Jews perpetuate the covenant and make their children a part of that eternal promise. Thus it was that Jesus became part of the eternal covenant with God. This was necessary if he were to be considered truly human.

The New Covenant, of which we are members, requires us not to make physical sacrifices, but rather spiritual ones. Our devotions are in the way live our lives. We are required to put others before ourselves and to love all of God's creation. So at the start of this new year let each of us resolve to renew our commitment to God. Let each of us make a resolution to change one thing in our daily routine to allow us more time for our devotions.

As Jesus came to be with us let us make time to be with others who need our help, and as circumstances change let us grasp that change as an opportunity to move closer to God. In this first month, the new year is full of possibility and hope. Let us grasp that and move forwards on our Christian journey with confidence and expectation.

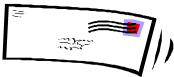

Church of England Children's Society

At the last Deanery Synod meeting the speaker was from The Children's Society. The following report is taken from minutes of that meeting:

MR. ALLAN BALDWIN, C OF E CHILDREN'S SOCIETY

Mr. Baldwin is an Anglican Reader, he became a voluntary speaker for The Children's Society and then a year ago moved to his post as community and fundraising manager for the Society in the Lichfield and Birmingham Dioceses. He is the link between the parishes in our deanery and is here to help. He will be pleased to talk to parishes or help with events for the Society.

Mr. Baldwin stressed that the Society is still the CHURCH OF ENGLAND Children's Society. It began 126 years ago opening a home for "waifs and strays". Since then it moved into fostering and adoption but was

always looking at areas where no other organisation was working. This led, in the 1980's, to looking at ways of helping

- 1) Runaways - children on the streets
 - 2) Youngsters in trouble with the law
 - 3) Disabled youngsters
 - 4) Young, unaccompanied asylum seekers
- Their mission to youngsters is always driven by Christian principles.

In order to survive and avoid returning home, some children see no option but to live dangerous lives on the streets.

The Society provides food, shelter, understanding, protection, hope - whatever needs a Child on the street may have. The goal is to support them and ensure others do too. Local authorities are slowly responding, and setting up "safe houses". Many factors can lead a child to commit crime. The goal here is to guide them to find a new way to live that is best for the child and for society as a whole.

The Children's Society are able to be independent of the government and local authorities because all money comes from voluntary sources. Its work and independence are more important than ever. A fairly new venture is to help young carers by trying to arrange help for them and some "childhood" for them.

'The Good Childhood Enquiry' has been commissioned by The Children's Society, but not run by them, so it is independent. The outcome will decide what the Society will do next. So far, results show that families, friends, learning, being wanted and loved are the main points highlighted.

'Stand By Me' is a campaign to get the government to realise that they need to do something about children in care and their

need for a voice.

There are many ways in which individuals and parishes can help support the Children's Society and Mr. Baldwin said that he found it humbling that so many continue to do so.

1) Have a collecting box - these are the main source of support in the parishes. Boxes bring in the biggest income (approx 2½ million pounds each year), apart from legacies.

2) Support a Christingle service - a great opportunity for evangelism.

3) Include The Children's Society as part of the church charitable giving.

4) Become a speaker in your local area.

5) Donations in memory of loved ones.

In conclusion, Mr. Baldwin thanked parishes for their support which is very much appreciated.

He emphasised the need for more people to have boxes and anyone who would like one may contact him on 01827 897954

The Bishop

This month, after the visit of Bishop Gordon to St. Luke's I thought I would include a piece on the role of the Bishop within the Church of England. In the first days of Christianity, over 2000 years ago, the twelve apostles (Jesus' disciples) were the sole directors and administrators of the Church. They appointed seven 'deacons' to help with practical tasks, and later the work of 'presbyters', or 'priests' began to emerge.

They were modelled on the elders of the Jewish synagogues, and were responsible for administration, government as well as teaching and worship in the local church. The word 'bishop' and 'presbyter' were interchangeable. Historians suggest that the 'chairman' of the 'college' of presbyters became known as bishop (which can mean 'overseer').

These days in the Church of England the bishop is understood to >lead the Church's mission

- >teach the Christian faith - through preaching, writing, in synods and councils and in the media
- >ordain men and women for the ministry of deacon and priest
- >confirm new Christians, young and older
- >administer Church affairs, in partnership with others
- >meet with fellow bishops, nationally and internationally
- >be involved in the secular world, having links with community leaders in industry, the public sector and voluntary service (27 senior bishops are members of the House of Lords)
- >minister to the clergy - they are licensed under the authority of the bishop and are answerable to him
- >model effective Christian leadership and lifestyle for clergy and lay people

So the Bishop plays a key role resourcing and inspiring the whole Church, particularly the clergy, who in turn lead and care for the lay people, who are daily in the front line of Christian mission - in their homes, schools, communities and workplaces.

Confirmation Classes

Confirmation Classes have started at the Vicarage but it's not too late to join. We will be meeting again on Tuesday 8th January at 7pm We have only so far had two sessions so there is very little to catch up on.

In the past Confirmation Classes have been run exclusively for those who are looking to confirm the promises made on their behalf at their baptism and so join the Church of England. This year I want to open these classes to anyone who wants to learn more about the church, its faith and beliefs and the rituals and practices that it has adopted over the centuries. Those seeking Confirmation should be 11 years or

over. I hope that a number of people will use this opportunity to come along and find out more about the Christian faith. Should you wish to know more about what we will be doing, then please ring the vicar on 01298 83742.

A good time was had by all and the tree looked wonderful when it was completed. A Big thank you to David Twigg who shaped the trunk and set the tree up on its base for us.

The Christmas Band Concert was well attended again this year despite the weather and we were treated to a medley of Christmas music and sing-a-long carols by the Hollinsclough Silver Band. I am delighted to report that after paying the Band we made a profit of £112 which will go to church funds.

The church was given the opportunity to have a stall at the official opening of the Skate Park. Thanks to all those who made cakes and produce for it we made nearly £40 in the morning despite the snow and the cold.

As you all know the church was not able to pay its Parish Share in full this year. Despite the Diocese being told of this in February they made no allowances. It was our intention to pay the same amount as last year plus inflation but we have managed to do a little better and have paid £12,000 this year as well as meeting all our other financial obligations. This will leave us a debt of just over £1000 which will be added to our share for 2008. I am still talking to the Diocese about this and hope to get a resolution on a sustainable figure in the near future.

PCC Meeting Monday 28th January at 7.30pm in the Balcony Room. The first item on the agenda will be a presentation by the Parish Funding Unit. Anyone who is interested in helping us to raise funds is very welcome to attend this presentation.

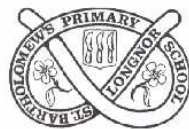

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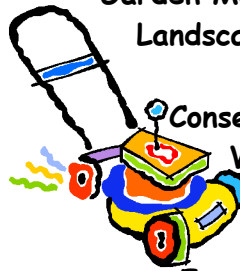
