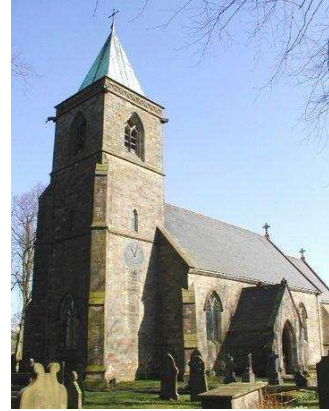

# Worship Leader's Letter

## The reality of faith in God

As we enter this New Year of 2009 even the most devoted Christians can't ignore the uncertainties we face. The whole world was caught up in a financial melt-down in the latter months of 2008. Established banking and financial institutions closed down, some of them overnight, and many people feared that not only their life savings but their present jobs were in real danger.

Almost daily the news has been gloomy and economic experts say the situation is the worst in living memory. How do we, as Christians, react to all this? What do we trust in? Has God something to say to us in these days?

An answer may be found in a well loved passage from the Bible — Psalm 23: 'The Lord is my shepherd . . he restores my soul .. he leads me .1 will dwell in the house of the Lord for ever.' But in the middle of this lovely psalm there are three reminders that Christians are NOT exempt from the realities of life. The psalmist speaks of 'the paths of righteousness', 'the valley of the shadow' and 'the presence of my enemies.' The mention of 'the paths of righteousness' is a reminder that we are called to love the Lord and live our lives in righteousness. The wonderful promises in this psalm come with a condition; they are given to those who determine by God's grace to live righteously. And that must be our first resolution for 2009. The 'valley of the shadow' may refer to death, but generally the reference here is wider. It means all those occasions when fear and sorrow and heart-break and loss come to even the best Christians.

Then there are our 'enemies.' Originally that probably meant those wanting to kill the psalmist. For us it may be the seduction of old temptations, the fears that paralyse us and the memories of sins that still haunt us. The psalmist is a realist!

As Christians we live our lives in the real world! We are not floating on cloud nine; we are rooted in a fallen world and surrounded by temptations and sins and infirmities. Any day, pain, an incurable disease, even death itself, may come to us or to those we love. How do we face these realities?

Psalm 23 has the answer. If we, by God's grace, will walk in the paths of righteousness,' then all the promises are ours!

The Lord will be our Shepherd. He will lead us by the still waters; he will restore our souls,



prepare a table for us in the wilderness, protect and guide us with his rod and staff and, at the end, bring us into the house of the Lord forever.

Let us make Psalm 23 our charter of faith for 2009

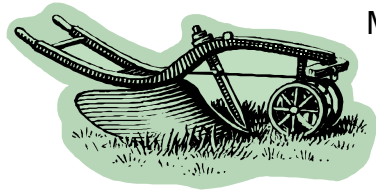

### Finance

2009 Parish Share - this is the money we have to pay to Lichfield Diocese.

The total for 2009 is £7,548, which works out at £20.68/day. In addition we have the regular maintenance of the church building and churchyard, insurance, heating, lighting etc. etc.

### Boundary Wall

You may have noticed that a section of the wall near to the main gate has fallen down. This was rebuilt in June 2007 at a cost of £675 and we received a small grant from the Peak District National Park Authority. Strenuous efforts continue to be made to contact the builder but, so far, without success.

### Church Roof

In the November magazine we reported that we had received a rough estimate of £25,000 and we were waiting for a report from the architect.

Following on from this the architect recommended a firm willing to repair (rather than replace) the roof.

The PCC made the decision for the repair. The necessary permission was given by the diocese and the firm arrived - only to tell us that in fact it was NOT possible to repair the roof after all and we need a new one.

Two more quotations have been asked for but as the magazine goes to print have not arrived.

We do not have the money for a new roof. Once the quotations arrive the PCC will have to make some very important

decisions. Any ideas/thoughts/comments from any people in the parish would be welcome. Also, anyone willing to serve on the PCC (Parochial Church Council).

## **From the Readership**

### **6 January - Epiphany**

On 6 January we celebrate Epiphany - the visit of the wise men to the baby Jesus. But who were these wise men? No one knows for sure. Matthew calls them 'Magi', and that was the name of an ancient caste of a priestly kind from Persia. It wasn't until the third century that they were they called kings - by a church father, Tertullian. Another church father, Origin, assumed there were three - to

correspond with the gifts given. Later Christian interpretation came to understand gold as a symbol of wisdom and wealth, incense as a symbol of worship and sacrifice, and myrrh as a symbol of healing - and even embalming. Certainly Jesus challenged and set aright the way in which the world handled all three of these things. Since the eighth century, the magi have had the names Balthasar, Caspar and Melchior.

# From the Manse

Dear Friends,

When we went out carol-singing we sang:

*We wish you a Merry Christmas  
And a Happy New Year.*

Well, I hope you did find at Christmas moments of joy and peace, whether through family and friends or through your awareness that the child in the stable is the promise that God is with you and you loved with an everlasting love.

Now we turn to the New Year and wonder what it will bring. We do this every January, but we suspect that 2009 will be an especially challenging year for our country and our world. We suspect there are difficult and troublesome times ahead. Like people around the world, we fear what the credit crunch and recession will mean for ourselves and for those around us.

Let me suggest three positive things this year could bring:

**First, we may recognise the folly of thinking that material things matter more than anything else.** The "shop until your drop" culture, often fuelled by borrowed money, revealed the poverty of our lives. We have been caught out by believing that true happiness comes from possessions rather than the quality of our lives in communion with each other.

**Second, we may rediscover what it means to care for one another.** For many people, with the loss of jobs and debts to repay, this is going to be a difficult year. Many people will be anxious and troubled. In ways that are sensitive, we could be a support to those going through difficult times. Indeed, we may

well value that understanding and friendship ourselves, either because of our own needs or because we are anxious for those close to us.

**Thirdly, we may encounter God's grace as we journey in faith.** The Wise Men set out on a journey not knowing what they would find at the end of it or what troubles they would encounter on the way.

Nowhere in the Bible does God offer us an easy life. Time and again, life is described as a journey into the unknown. The promise God makes is not that we will be free from trouble but the assurance, "I am with you!" It is the same promise the risen Christ makes at the end of Matthew's Gospel: "I am with you always to the end of time."

In the challenges of the coming year, those who trust in God will find a source of wisdom, hope and strength as we respond to all the challenges which come our way. The calling of the church is for us to help each other:

*Brother, sister, let me serve you,  
Let me be as Christ to you;  
Grant that I may have the grace  
To let you be my servant, too.*  
(Richard Gillard)

#### IN MEMORIAM.

In the interval between my leaving Quarnford and the Institution of your new Vicar, there have passed away three of

your well-known parishioners.

Mr. Billinge bore the discomfort of his long and painful illness with much patience, and was always grateful and responsive when visited.

Mr. George Day, who lived to a good old age was always thoughtful, balanced and responsive. It was indeed, a pleasure and a privilege to go and see him and to talk of that better world where the weaknesses and discomforts of this mortal life will have passed away.

The enforced retirement of old age and declining health was for him a school of preparation for the life to which he has passed. He seemed to have learned much and to have ripened for the Kingdom of his Lord and Saviour.

Mr. Joseph Goodwin had been in delicate health for many years. We frequently held Cottage Meetings at his house. He was a gentle spirit, who never was hard upon any man either in speech or manner. A regular attendant at Church when health permitted, he was always glad to hear of the Church's progress when he was no longer able to attend, and from time to time to partake of the holy Communion.
