Change is always unsettling and most of us prefer things to carry on in the same routine because it is known and therefore

comfortable. We all find security in routine. But we should not forget that Jesus came to institute change in a people who had become bogged down in their comfortable routine and had lost site of the true meaning of their relationship with God.

It is far too easy at times to allow the routine to carry us while our minds become detached from the purpose. Jesus started to challenge many of the assumptions that had been held by people for centuries. He began by choosing companions who were not learned members of the ruling elite but rather simple men who were prepared to listen with open minds to the things that he had to teach them. He showed them that it was not so much the ritual that mattered but the way they treated other people.

He taught them that God had created everyone and everyone had the opportunity to enter the Kingdom of Heaven. He taught them that it was not so much what a person did that mattered but what was in their heart. He showed them that if they truly loved God then this would control how they responded to others. He taught them that God was always available to those who looked for him in prayer and would always forgive those who were genuinely sorry for the things they had done wrong.

As both you and I enter this time of change in our lives let us never forget that God walks with us. Through prayer we will overcome all the difficulties and be strengthened. You will never be far from my prayers and I hope that you will pray on occasions for us as a family as we adjust to our new situation.

The Benefice

Last month we started to look at the work of the General Synod of the Church of England. We looked at the work of the various Commissions. This month I want to look at

The PRINCIPAL COMMITTEES OF THE GENERAL SYNOD

Business Committee

The Committee is responsible for organizing the business of the Synod, enabling it to fulfill its role as a legislative and deliberative body.

Legislative Committee

The Legislative Committee is a statutory committee, required by the Church of England Assembly (Powers) Act 1919 and the Constitution of the General Synod. It acts in accordance with the procedures prescribed by the 1919 Act in, inter alia, submitting Measures to Parliament for approval once they have received final approval by the General Synod.

Standing Orders Committee

The Committee keeps under review the procedures and Standing Orders of the General Synod.

Appointments Committee

There is provision for the establishment of the Appointments Committee both in the National Institutions Measure 1998 and in the Standing Orders of the General Synod. It is, therefore, a Committee both of the [Archbishops' Council](#) and the [General Synod](#) and it is responsible for making such appointments and/or recommendations on appointments to synodical and other bodies as the Synod or the Archbishops' Council require.

Appointments include:

- appointments to synodical bodies, such as legislative steering or revision committees, the Standing Orders Committee etc

- appointments to Boards, Councils and Committees of the Archbishops' Council
- representatives of the Synod on the governing bodies of theological training institutions
- representatives of the Synod on the governing bodies of mission agencies ([Partnership for World Mission](#))
- representatives of the Church of England at ecumenical conferences
- representatives of the Church of England at the governing assemblies of other denominations

So how is the General Synod made up?
This can be answered by looking at the CONVECATION
CONVOCATIONS OF CANTERBURY AND YORK

History

The division of the English Church into the Provinces of Canterbury and York dates from 735. By the beginning of the fifteenth century each Province had a Convocation, an ecclesiastical assembly the membership of which consisted of the archbishop and bishops, the abbots and priors, the deans and provosts of cathedrals and collegiate churches, the archdeacons, two proctors for the clergy of each diocese and one for the chapter of each collegiate church. The clergy formed the Lower House and the bishops the Upper House of each Convocation.

The Reformation made no change to the structure or procedures of the Convocations, except that their size was considerably reduced following the dissolution of the monasteries and the canon law made by the Convocations was subordinated to the Crown and to the statute law made by Parliament.

In 1919 the Church Assembly was formed under the Church Assembly (Powers) Act.

It consisted of the Convocations together with a House of Laity and its Constitution and Procedures were under the control of the Convocations. The Church Assembly had power to pass measures which, if approved by parliament, received Royal assent and became part of the statute law of England. The Convocations continued to exist alongside the Church Assembly, retaining their traditional powers. Canon Law continued to be made by the Convocations, meeting and voting separately. In 1970 the Church Assembly was replaced by the General Synod, which consists of the Convocations of Canterbury and York together with a House of Laity. The Upper Houses of the Convocations combine to form the House of Bishops and the Lower Houses combine to form the House of Clergy. The Convocations continue to exist, and although most of their powers were transferred to the General Synod, they do retain some residual rights.

Constitution

Each of the Convocations consists of two Houses, an Upper House and a Lower House. The Upper House consists of all the diocesan bishops in the Province, the Bishop of Dover (in the case of the Convocation of Canterbury), bishops elected by the suffragan bishops of the Province, and any other bishops residing in the province who are members of the Archbishops' Council. The Archbishop presides. The Lower House comprises clergy (other than bishops) who have been elected, appointed or chosen in accordance with Canon H2 and the rules made under it (including deans, archdeacons, proctors from the dioceses and university constituencies and clerical members of religious communities) together with ex-officio members. The Prolocutor chairs

meetings and acts as spokesperson of the House.

In Memory

Doris Prince



Doris was born on the 25th February 1919 at Hays Gate Hulme End. Weighing just 2lb here father said that she would fit into a quart jug. At first she slept in a drawer at home to keep her warm.

Doris had a brother Dennis who was sadly killed in WW II and a sister Sylvia who died in 1993. She lived a lot of her early life with her aunt Clara at Hays Gate walking each day up to Warslow School. In the late 1920s her parents moved to Swallow Moss at Reapsmoor and it was from here that she completed her schooling at the age of 14.

Like many girls her age Doris went into service, working at the Light Railway Pub at Hume End. In about 1940 she started cleaning for Sam Prince at Knowle Top. They soon fell in love and were married here in church on Easter Saturday 1942. They continued to live at Knowle Top and added to their family with Dennis in December of that year followed by Eric in May 1944, John in January 1948 and Winston in October of 1951. As the children grew they were all sent to Sunday school.

Doris enjoyed Gardening and grew her own fruit and veg. Here the children came in handy, being set to do the weeding in the summer. As well as helping on the Small Holding Doris would go and help Judith out in the Fish & Chip Shop in Longnor by doing the cleaning in the café. She also used to save the foil trays from the pies.

Doris and Sam enjoyed going on Holiday to Scotland and would take one of Bernard

Sutton's Coach Tours there. They travelled around visiting many places of interest.

In 1962 the grandchildren started to arrive and sadly in 1973 Sam died at the age of 69 and two years later Doris moved into Longnor. By 1987 the Great-Grandchildren began to arrive and indeed she was here to see the latest addition early this year. In 1989 Doris moved to Leek.

In her later years Doris enjoyed going to Leek Day Centre on Mondays and Wednesdays. She also very much enjoyed going on trips to the Pantomime as well as visiting Llandudno and Blackpool to see the illuminations.

Doris was at heart a quiet person who didn't like a fuss made. She enjoyed doing jigsaws and watching sport on television. She enjoyed watching most sports but snooker was her favourite. She followed with rapt attention the career of Ronnie O' Sullivan and woe betide anyone who rang up when the snooker was on. Doris was also very thoughtful never forgetting to send a card when it was someone's birthday.

NEW PROJECT IDEAS

WEBSITE & LEAFLET UPDATE

- A re-print with little change will cost £646 and a full revamp would cost £946. Tina has provided Debbie with an alternative favourable quote at £515 for a re-print.

- Debbie and John will be writing/visiting all those advertised on the current leaflet to gain their support and advise them that the cost will be £25.00, which also includes the website. Debbie and John made contact with all those concerned and did have 2 space spaces, however these have now been taken by REAP and St Bartholomew's Church.

- Website - John has gained access to allow him to input the advertisers from the leaflet onto the site.

As the site does not seem to be being utilised effectively it was decided that after the leaflet has been reprinted more information and work needs to be done on the site.

The action group needs to take control of the website and agree who will be responsible.

ANY OTHER BUSINESS

- As members of the action group have been out and about gathering information for some of the items above, residents commented on the following issues:-

Condition of the public toilets.

On the Crowdecote Road the 2 old 30 MPH signs need to be taken down and the new one's have slipped out of place.

The overall signage into the village.

Action - On behalf of the residents the action group will send a letter to the Parish Council advising them of the above issues.

- Sam made the group aware that the First Responders were having to take the advanced driving course as part of their development towards blue light training. The cost of this training is £1050.00 which they receive no funding or support towards. Therefore Sam proposed that the group donate £350 towards this training, John seconded this and the whole group agreed. Sam has also made contact with Sheen and Hollinsclough to see if they would be prepared to contribute towards this training, they will be speaking to their action groups shortly. Action - Gaynor to provide Sam with a contact for Warslow action group.

- Arts For Health - Sam up dated the group on this project that started originally in Hartington. A group was started in Longnor and was very successful with a good level of interest. Sam confirmed that the Hartington project now have some further funding and the Longnor classes can start again. As the classes run in the Balcony room David now feels that he needs to put a case forward for the installation of a stair lift.

- Sam extended an invitation to all action group members and the SMCVS Community Development Team to attend the school on Monday 19 May for the official breathing places opening.

- All meetings will be held on the 2nd Wednesday of each month at the Balcony Room

ANY OTHER BUSINESS

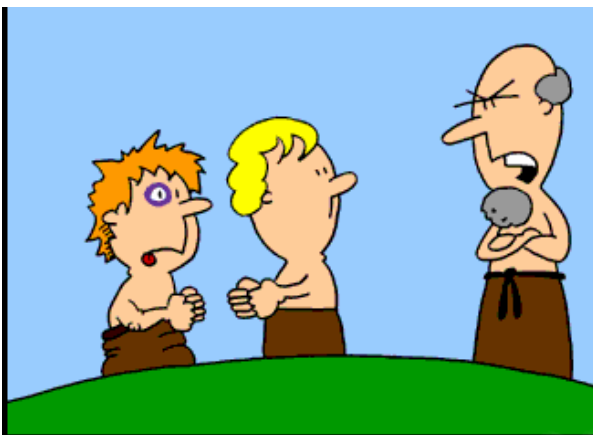
- David Nicol announced at the beginning of the meeting that he will be leaving in August and going back into the teaching profession. He will be greatly missed by the members of the action group.

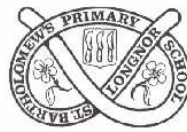
- Event - Tuesday 19 August Medieval Music evening in the Church. During the interval there will be an opportunity for people to try out the instruments.

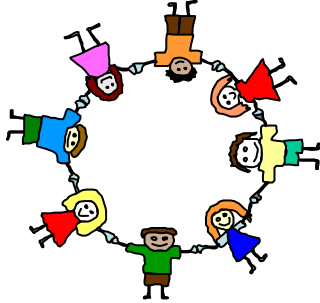

In Memory

Margaret Robinson

Margaret was born at Far Brook Farm on the 25th March 1941 and aged 3 the family moved to Oxenstytch Farm. From here Margaret attended Ramshaw School, before moving on to Leek County School where she stayed until aged 14. From school she went to work at the IXL Laundry in Buxton until 1969 when the Laundry moved to Leek

Margaret moved to Leek with her mother after the death of her Father and went to work in the Sports Clothing Mill on Macclesfield Road. Here she stayed until her retirement at 60. She remained at



Sherburn Road, living with mum, until her death in 1975 and then she remained alone until about 5 years ago when she and her lifelong friend Peter who was now a widower became companions for each other. Sadly Peter died last year.

In December last year Margaret had an accident and broke her leg. She was admitted to Hospital and it was discovered that she had bone cancer. She had one course of treatment but declined any more when she was told that the cancer was spreading rapidly. She went to stay with Peter's daughter and son-in-law, John and Ann, until she died.

Margaret was a very quiet lady but with a good sense of humour. She had a very infectious laugh that could cheer up any occasion. She was also a person who knew her own mind and was not afraid to speak it if the occasion demanded. She was very independent of spirit and never wanted to be a burden on anyone. She was also fiercely loyal. I remember her coming to our All Souls Service here last year when we said prayers for Peter and the others who had died during the previous year.

Margaret loved this area and would often go walking across the hills and moors. She also had a great interest in local history and village tradition which explains her addiction to the Archers. She also enjoyed reading and watching her two favourite programmes, Eastenders and Coronation Street.

Cyril Hudson



Cyril was born at Bank House on 17th June 1923 at Back-o-the-Brook. From here the family moved to Croft Bottom. In the mid 50s they moved

again to Thickwithins. During that time Cyril worked with dad on the farm as well as finding other work around the area. He would often be up early and milk the cows before setting out to school. In his teens he helped out with the building of the ammunition stores at Harpur Hill by mixing the mortar for the builders. As a young man he worked for a number of different farmers, including Garnets at Glutton Bridge and at Fawside. I know that he is remembered by many as being a lovely young man with gentle ways. Well he must have had winning ways because he and Mary were married at Longnor Chapel and moved into Gollin Cottage to begin married life together.

In the Mid 60s the family moved to Top House Farm which Cyril did up himself, being one of the breed of farmers who could turn his hand to most things. Here he remained until his death taking care of the farm and of Mary. Cyril enjoyed keeping up to date with farming practices and had a pair of field glasses that he used to see what was going on around him. He enjoyed going to Market and visited Bakewell and Chelford as well as Leek. Like many of his contemporaries he enjoyed a drink at the Angel in Leek after the Market and a chat with other farmers from around the area.

My abiding memory of Cyril will be him sitting in his Land Rover and carefully asking "Now Vicar how much do I owe for the Magazine" But let the last word go to one of his friends who said to me the other day "He was a good Farmer"

Rhoda was born in Ashton Under-Lyne, Lancashire, to John and Mabel Barber, brought up with her brother Bob in a very humble but loving home. She was 7 when the war broke out and 14 when it ended. These years spent living on the outskirts of Manchester was not easy, living life as normal whilst under constant threat of air raids. This background was the basis of Rhoda's character. Proud to be a lass from the north, tough, resilient but above all able to remain cheerful and deal with whatever life through at her.

She left school at 14 and trained as a short hand typist and worked at a local company in her home town. Rhoda met her future husband, Ron at the age of 15 and they were married in 1953. They went on to have 4 children; Lynda, Paul, Kathryn and Mark. With the family completed Ran and Rhoda bought Lower Dry Stone Edge farm and the family settled into a new life in this area.

Rhoda became the secretary at the village school and totally embraced the country life. She was secretary at Flash School for 12 years. Whilst at the school she helped in the classroom with reading etc., escorting children to swimming lessons in Buxton and at Easter times would dress up as the Easter bunny complete with a fluffy hat, gloves and tail. She would set off and hide the eggs in a local field.

Christmas time would be spent helping with Christmas concerts at the village hall and carol services at this very church.

Rhoda's children all married and she became a much loved mother-in-law to Ken, Joy, Charlie & Helen.

Once the family had started to leave home Rhoda and husband Ran left Dry Stone Edge and settled in Longnor. At this time she took up a position at Dairy Crest, Hartington, working in the office. A job she greatly enjoyed and held for 11 years. Rhoda's husband Ron took early retirement due to the loss of his eyesight and a new edition was added to the family in the form of Melody, Ron's guide dog.

Rhoda became a grandmother to John, Clare, Andrew, Grace, Louise, Michelle, Rebecca, and Luke, and a Great-Grandmother to Sally, Georgina, Samuel, Toby, Matthew and Emma. She loved the simple life and was happiest in her garden or with her beloved family.

When Ron passed away in 1997, Melody was retired as a guide dog and became Rhoda's close companion. She moved to Leek in 1998 to be closer to her family. Melody her beloved dog passed away two years ago and Rhoda adopted another Labrador called Simba who filled the gap left by Melody. They lived together until the last few weeks of Rhoda's life

Rhoda loved to bake, her raspberry buns are legendary gaining a worldwide reputation as far as her nieces and nephews in New Zealand. Rhoda was a much loved aunt, she was always a shoulder to cry on, provide a meal and somewhere to camp out if needed. Always young at heart, loved a practical joke, never serious and always saw the funny side to everything.

Her husband Ron came off worse on more than one occasion. She once slipped on some ice whilst carrying a frozen leg of lamb in a carrier bag, spun around and smacked Ron in the mouth. She once mistakenly gave him sleeping tablets

instead of flu tablets rendering him out cold for a number of hours. One time Ron spent all day Saturday repairing the wiring in the boiler for Rhoda to slip on some oil and rip all the wires back out again. Luckily the family escaped any serious injuries and Rhoda and Ron had a very happy marriage.

Rhoda survived cancer 15 years ago and carried on regardless, steadfastly refusing to give in or make a fuss about it. 18 months ago she was diagnosed with cancer again, and after her and Lynda were told it was terminal she just said 'let's go and get a coffee and I need to look for a new bedspread'.

She refused to tell anyone but her children and older grandchildren. She just carried on in her own way, never complained or moaned or asked why me?

She lived her life as she started it, drawing on her strength of character, borne out of her humble beginnings, a toughness you would never believe such a gentle lady could have and above all a sense of humour and fun a lass from the north could never lose.

St. Swithin's Day

St. Swithin's Day is 15th July, a day on which people watch the weather for tradition says that whatever the weather is like on St. Swithin's Day, it will continue so for the next forty days.

There is a weather-rhyme is well known throughout the British Isles since Elizabethan times.

'St Swithin's Day, if it does rain
Full forty days, it will remain
St Swithin's Day, if it be fair
For forty days, t'will rain no more.'

St. Swithin (or more properly, Swithun) was a Saxon Bishop of Winchester and legend says that as he lay on his deathbed, he asked to be buried out of doors, where he would be trodden on and rained on. For nine years, his wishes were followed, but then, the monks of Winchester attempted to remove his remains to a splendid shrine inside the cathedral on 15 July 971. According to legend there was a heavy rain storm either during the ceremony or on its anniversary.

This led to the old wives' tale (folklore) that if it rains on St Swithin's Day (July 15th), it will rain for the next 40 days in succession, and a fine 15th July will be followed by 40 days of fine weather.

However, according to the Met Office, this old wives' tale is nothing other than a myth. It has been put to the test on 55 occasions*, when it has been wet on St Swithin's Day and 40 days of rain did not follow.

From the Diocese

The Lichfield Centre for Christian Studies

The Lichfield Centre for Christian Studies is an exciting new partnership between Lichfield Cathedral, Staffordshire University and the Diocese of Lichfield. It's first project, the M.A. Course in *Theology, Context and the Pastoral Imagination* has received its final validation from Staffordshire University and is currently recruiting to start in August 2008.

This M.A. is shaped by its three key themes:

Theology belongs to several contexts: the Church, the Academy and the Public Square; it is diminished if it is excluded from any. Theology is central to the design of the course and all modules relate to it through a reflective inter-connectedness. For example aspects of Doctrine will be illustrated with reference to literature the arts and film as well through cultural history and ideas.

Studying **Context** will involve not just geography but historical and contemporary contexts. An example would be the contribution of the Lunar men and the work of Erasmus and Charles Darwin in shaping the industrial, intellectual and scientific innovations in the late C18 and C19. The term context will include investigation of a variety of socio-cultural contexts found across the West Midlands, from multi-ethnic, interfaith inner city contexts to deeply rural ones.

The Pastoral Imagination explains the relationship between theory and practice and the relationship between need and care. Through an interpretation of these different facets of corporate life it will be possible to understand how different communities and Churches are sustained.

- 2) The Bible Interpretation and Imagination
- 3) The Measure of Mission
- 4) Leadership and the Pastoral Imagination (1)

Year 2

- 1) Literature Art and the Christian Imagination
- 2) Spirituality and Religion: Theory and Construction
- 3) Issues and Methods in Research
- 4) Leadership and the Pastoral Imagination (2)

Year 3

Dissertation
