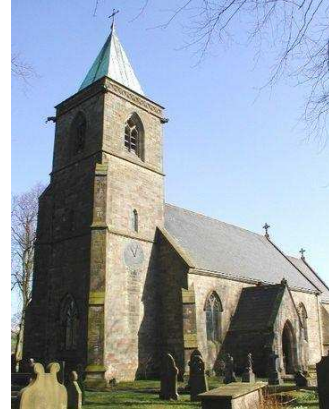

A Tail to Tell

Rats and Squirrels: A parable for Lent

When I worked at Bristol Cathedral, there was a short-lived problem with rats in the building. There was great consternation and appropriate measures were taken. At the same time, grey squirrels in the Cathedral garden delighted visitors with their antics. One of the vergers commented whimsically, squirrels are rats with good PR i.e., an extra feature — a bushy tail - somehow made them seem affectionate rather than frightening.

Image is not everything

But beneath the images which attract and inspire

Presentation and PR

We live in a world with that hyper-awareness of the importance of presentation — good PR (Public Relations). For politicians, pop stars or even priests, there is great value in presenting attractively — just as the bushy tail and sense of playfulness give squirrels an image which fascinates and entertains. Part of Christian playfulness is to take time and trouble to notice the grace and beauty in God's world — in nature, in other people, in the universe beyond. There is much to appreciate, and seeing the world in this way helps us learn to make ourselves a worthy sign of grace and beauty too. Paying attention to the grain of goodness better grafts us into that promotion.

There is another kind of reality - rats and a rodent life which seems dark, threatening, destructive.

Christianity takes this reality seriously too. Words like sin' and the cross of Christ' indicate that within each of us, and in our relations with others there can be dark, destructive forces. There is a tendency today to deny this reality, to subsume all such elements under the notion of 'difference' rather than deviancy. Every lifestyle and value system dons its bushy tail and struts its stuff to claim legitimacy and attractiveness on their own terms. This is the great heresy of our times.

Making Choices

The fact is that squirrels and rats both exist. The former are by no means perfect and can be pests, but they touch an instinct in us for grace and beauty. The latter are more dangerous in terms of disease and operating in darker places - they touch an instinct to recoil from dirt and danger. We need to cultivate the same instinct for choices in our lifestyles and value systems. That is the point of our baptism promises. If we simply allow anything and everything, we, and our world, will remain a frustrating mix of light and dark: attraction and repulsion. If we learn to pray, to appreciate light and grace and goodness, and grow ourselves more truly in this way, then the rodent values and behaviour will be better controlled (never eliminated in this life). This is a parable for Lent: the tail the Christian Gospel has to tell — proclaiming the ultimate triumph of light over darkness in the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. Could you find better PR?!

The Bishop of Lichfield's Lent Appeal 2009

Part of Bishop Jonathan's letter: *This year my annual Lent Appeal falls at time when most of us have to tighten our belts. Many will face real hardship; some will lose their jobs and livelihoods. So I ask for your support this year knowing I am asking a lot. But the financial crisis is also world wide, affecting millions of the world's very poorest. That's why I ask you to dig deep and offer your continued support so that we can make a real difference in a practical demonstration of God's love to a hurting world.*

In my Lent Appeal this year I want to focus on helping the elderly, particularly elderly poor people and for the home element, for the first time, I am asking for nominations of suitable recipients.

Part of the appeal will go to support church projects helping elderly people in Swaziland, Namibia and Bangladesh. Part will go to groups such as Cheadle and District Home Link Scheme which provides care and support for the elderly and housebound to help them remain in their homes as long as possible. Beehives in Albania



Each year we sponsor a child through "Biblelands" and a scheme to help disabled people in Albania. We have recently received a report of a project to supply beehives in Albania.

"The mountain areas of Albania are very beautiful and have an abundance of flowers and trees, just right for collection of nectar and pollen. £1,000 purchased eleven complete beehives. These were given to eleven families who had a disabled member in two of the most poverty-stricken areas and where families are not well educated. This was an attempt to help lift the families from the poverty trap, giving them something to start them on the way to producing and selling honey over a period of time. It also meant that the woman of the family and, if appropriate, the person with the disability could work within range of home and so the caring role could continue" The scheme goes on to say how successful the scheme was.

Across the Sahara with Sir Philip & Lady B.

Most people round here have heard of Sir Philip Brocklehurst's exploits in the

Antarctic, when he sailed with Shackleton on the Nimrod. Less well known is the story of his journey across the Sahara by car from Algiers to Khartoum, accompanied by Lady Brocklehurst and George Gratton as mechanic.

The year was 1930 and the 'Transsaharien' people in Algiers tried to put them off; it



was difficult to find the track, there was danger from sand storms and it was madness to attempt the

crossing without wireless or guide. However, with eight tin tanks for water and 100 gallons of petrol on board, the adventure began on 27th January, in pelting rain on a road engineered by the Foreign Legion.

We are lucky to have access to a copy of Lady Brocklehurst's diary along with wonderful photos taken on their 5000 mile journey.

Your Rural Police News

Over recent weeks we have been experiencing an increase in the number of vehicles being broken into on rural car parks. This includes those in Alstonefield, Hulme End, Milldale and The Roaches. These locations are attractive to the thief because they are isolated and provide less chance of being sighted than in a residential area.

We have put a number of measures in place to help identify and deter the criminals including increased patrols, advice leafleting and the strategic placement of CCTV.

Owners have a role to play in reducing the opportunity for thieves and you should consider the following basic rules when parking your vehicle.

- Lock your doors/boot/windows
- Remove all valuables from your vehicle. If there is no alternative lock them away out of view.
- Park in a well lit, populated area
- Always use security devices

MOORLANDS FIRST
RESPONDERS TO CHANGE
NAME

The Moorlands First Responder Group which covers 999 medical emergencies in Flash, Longnor, Hollinsclough, Quarnford, Elkstones, Warslow, Sheen, Hulme End, Meerbrook, Tittesworth, Thorncliffe, Upper Hulme and The Roaches is changing its name to The Flash and Longnor Community First Responders (CFR's)

The Group was first formed in 2000 and was known as Flash CFR's because all the volunteers came from that area, however over the years new volunteers joined from other villages and the name was changed to Moorlands CFR's. We now feel that the

name does not sufficiently identify our group as all other Responder Groups name themselves after the villages or town they serve.

Our group is totally funded by grants and voluntary contributions and donations. As costs rise, especially the running cost of our ambulance, insurance, medical equipment and training we are getting desperately short of funds. We also need new members so that we can achieve our aim of providing emergency cover 24 hours a day 7 days a week.

As a matter of interest many people think we are part of the Wetton and Alstonfield CFR's and therefore many donations are given to them. We have in past kept a low profile on such delicate matters but in these difficult financial times and because our funds are so low we now feel it is time to state that we are not part of Wetton and Alstonfield. We urgently need our community to support us both financially and in manpower.

We are enormously grateful to those in our community who have supported us in the past and we hope that our change of name will reflect our commitment to serve you.

Dear Sir/Madam,

I recently obtained permission to build a pair of semi detached houses for local occupancy in the village of Sheen but also to people of adjoining parishes who fulfil the Peak Park's criteria e.g. persons living with parents/family or in temporary accommodation, preferably born in the area. 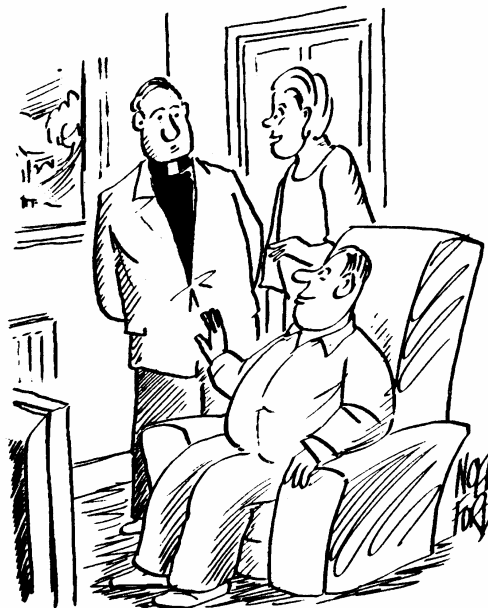

From the Manse

Dear Friends,

What a joy to read a book that opens windows in the mind! Since, the book I've been reading is a Bible Commentary that will confirm your judgement that Colin is a sad case! You may be right, but I'm still going to sing the praises of Clare Amos' commentary on the Book of Genesis (published by "Epworth").

In part, it's interesting reading this book with its stories of creation at the same time as we celebrate the 150th anniversary of the publication of Charles Darwin's "Origin of the Species" in 1859. Clare Amos sees the Book of Genesis and Charles Darwin's "opus magnus" as quite different kinds of writing.

The Book of Genesis isn't a scientific book but a book which explores the relationship between God, this world and us human beings. It speaks of a God who was "in the beginning", through whom all things have their being and to whom human beings are answerable for how they care for this earth and what they do with their lives.

What Darwin recognised, with a flash of brilliance, is the way in which all forms of life, including our own, have change and developed in the light of our ability to adapt to new circumstances. He reveals part of the story of how life has come to be as it is today.

In Genesis, the first person we encounter living in a world we can recognise as our own is Abraham. He is a central figure in three of the world's great religions:

Judaism, Christianity and Islam. What is fascinating about him is the way he is a man both of strength and weakness.

The story of Abraham is of a man who hears God speaking to him, telling him to leave the familiar world of home, family and community and to travel to a land that God will give him. He sets out, a wanderer and alien, who depends on the kindness of others and yet proves to be far from a kind man himself, not least to his wives, Sarah and Hagar.

The story raises all sorts of questions and often doesn't give us answers. Is the promised land for his family alone or is it a land to be shared by all? How should those who are aliens be treated both when Abraham is "the wanderer" and when others wander into the life of his family? Is Abraham wrong to believe God wants him to sacrifice his son in the same way that we sometimes mis-hear what God is saying to us?

It's a great story, and if anyone would like to explore the story of Abraham further then do come to Hollinsclough Chapel Hall on Thursday 5th. March from 10 - Noon. We'll look at some of the themes about faith and faithful living which crop up as we retell the stories about Abraham. No easy answers, but plenty to think and talk about!
