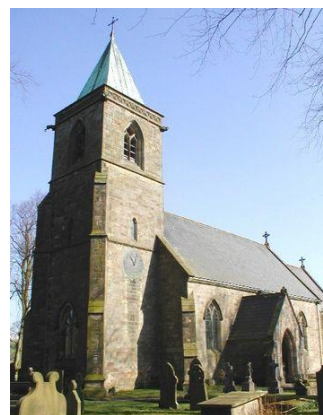

## *From the Vicarage*

Dear Friends,  
Easter is late this year; we will be celebrating it on Sunday 24<sup>th</sup> April, which is almost the latest date that it can be. (Do ask if you want to know how the date is calculated!). That means that the season of Lent begins on the 9<sup>th</sup> March, Ash Wednesday, and you will find elsewhere the details of the Deanery Service that we are invited to attend that evening. We shall also be arranging a number of Lent Lunches, starting on the 17<sup>th</sup> of this month, and again the details of this are elsewhere in this month's magazine; even if you do nothing else special for Lent, can I encourage you to come to one or more of these lunches, which provide a simple meal of soup and bread, and give a good opportunity to talk to people from other churches that we might not see very often. I look forward to seeing you there.

As some of you will know, there is a legal requirement for each parish church to hold an Annual Parochial Church Meeting, which gives the chance to review the events of the past year, to look at the church accounts, and to elect Wardens and the members of the PCC. These have to be held before the end of April, and since we want to avoid the weeks either side of Easter, this year the meetings are all in the early part of April. The dates are:

Tue. 5<sup>th</sup> 7.30pm Sheen  
Thurs. 7<sup>th</sup> 7.30pm Quarnford  
Mon. 11<sup>th</sup> 7.30pm Longnor

I wanted to give you those dates now because you may not get the April magazine many days before the first of those meetings.

Can I encourage you, if you think of yourself as being a member of one of our churches, to attend the appropriate

meeting. They are open to anyone who lives in the parish, and all residents are allowed to vote for their Wardens, but only those on the church Electoral Roll are able to vote on other matters. Each of our churches face a number of serious challenges, from difficulty in raising enough money to pay the bills to small congregations where there are not enough people to do the work that is required. As you will know, there has recently been (and still is as I write) a threat to close the school at Flash at the end of the summer term because of low numbers. Parents and members of the community generally are doing their best to keep the school open for the benefit of both the children who are there now and those who may want to attend the school in the future. We are not yet at the stage where any of our churches are under a similar threat of closure, but there are anxieties about how we can sustain the life of each one. So please take the opportunity of the Annual Meetings to come along and share in the discussion about money and our work in the parish.

But before we get to April we have March and the season of Lent, which is often seen as a time for giving up luxuries, or for making a new commitment to something. Apart from the lunches, I am intending to hold a few meetings, on either Monday or Tuesday evenings, looking at some of the incidents from the last few days of Jesus' life. I hope his example will inspire and challenge us as we serve God today. These meetings will not start until the 21<sup>st</sup> March at the earliest, and I will send out a letter with more details before then. But please let me know if you might be interested in sharing in them.

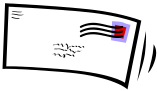

The minutes of the last meeting were agreed as a true and accurate record.

**1. Christmas Market** Cancelled due to weather, replaced with Christmas Fare in the school which proved very successful.

The Action Group wished to thank Richard and Gill Kebble and Rose for all their hard work and effort with regard to the Christmas fare and all the other members of the committee for their time, commitment and input.

Due to this year's weather problems it has been agreed to run the "Christmas Fare" as an Autumn Fare on the Saturday of Wakes week the 10th September. In addition the Christmas Fare will be re-run in the school hall in conjunction with the school.

### News from Hollinsclough School

13th January saw the Open Day of our "Flexi School Learning Hub", the aim of which is to help facilitate a relationship between the school, parents who choose to home educate their children, and the children themselves. The Open Day was very successful and we are now running the Learning Hub every other Friday (in March the dates are 11th and 25th). For families with children attending Little Berries pre-school, or registered to attend the main school, there is no charge for access and for those who are not registered we charge a fee of £4.00 per family per session to

cover costs of sundry items used.

We have been joining with Flash and Longnor schools at St Bartholomews for dance on Wednesday afternoons this term. On Monday 14th February this culminated in a performance at Buxton Opera House - the children were brilliant and all enjoyed themselves.

In February we had our first two of eight sessions with our creative partner, Sue Lawty, and the children have begun work on an outdoor space project. This project will help to develop creative thinking within the school and local community. Our Peak Park Ranger, Hazel Winder, has been working with the children on a winter wildlife project to provide hibernation boxes for hedgehogs. We intend to make at least three boxes and locate them around the school grounds.

One of our topics this term is "Time". If anybody has any old clocks or watches (or sundials!) to lend us we would be very grateful. The older children are studying the Romans as part of the Time topic, and the younger children are learning about Mary Seacole who was a Crimean war heroine, and Florence Nightingale.

Coming later this term - on 14th March we will be attending an all day dance workshop at Leek High School with Longnor and Flash. Of course 8th March is Shrove Tuesday which will no doubt include pancake making and eating, and we will look at why it is traditional to do this on

this day. On 23rd March there will be an African workshop at Manifold, and we wish Mrs Evans at St Bartholomew a safe and rewarding trip to Kenya. Jill Ferguson has been working with the children in dance and drama with a chocolate theme, and the children will be performing a chocolate-themed play at Easter.

Little Berries is our pre-school provision, offering a fun, relaxed and positive environment for the little learners. Our numbers are increasing with children travelling from as far afield as Congleton. Little Berries is available during term time on Mondays, Wednesdays and Thursdays 9am - 1pm for ages 2+. ## From the Manse

As I write, Libya appears to be on the brink of profound change. In yet another Middle Eastern country, the people have had enough of their dictator and Colonel Muammar Gaddafi's days as ruler of Libya are nearly over. Change will have been costly and several hundred demonstrators will have lost their lives in this uprising.

No doubt in Tunisia, Egypt and Libya, the names of the dead will be remembered and memorials will be erected, as they have been in Ireland. A few months ago I visited Kilmainham Prison in Dublin, now a museum, but in 1916 the place where nine IRA leaders were shot after the Easter Uprising. It was a turning point in Irish history and those executed by British soldiers are now household names.

In March, as Lent begins, we shall remember the name of another man who was executed by the civil authority. Jesus suffered the fate of many of those who have challenged those with power and was executed as a threat to Rome and the status quo.

He wasn't the only one to challenge the Romans. There were groups of nationalists, the Zealots, who sought to remove the Romans by armed force. They failed, and the punishment they suffered was crucifixion, a grim public warning of what happened to anyone who challenged the power of Rome!

Jesus' attitude to the Romans was very different. According to Matthew and Luke, one of the temptations Jesus faced was to become a nationalist, military leader. It suggests that Jesus was seen to have qualities which could have suited him for that role: an ability to inspire, a well-

organised mind, toughness and determination.

Instead, Jesus offered the Romans two gifts. First, he offered them his appreciation of them as human beings and as people with responsibility. He spoke of a Roman centurion as having more faith than anyone in Israel. He told the Pharisees to pay the tax which was owed to Caesar. He said, "Love your enemies" and whether he thought of the Romans as his enemy or not, they were certainly people to be loved in the same way that God loved them.

The second gift he offered the Romans was the "Kingdom of God". This was a Kingdom where God's love prevailed; a Kingdom of right relationships where all were valued equally, where the old order was turned upside down and the poor and the powerless had a special place. This second "gift" challenged their power, their motives and their actions.

It would be interesting to listen to the reports that the Romans' spies made about Jesus. When he rode into Jerusalem he would already have been a marked man: known for his ability to rouse a crowd with enthusiasm, called by some a "Messiah" (a dangerous term for an anointed king), who spoke about God's priorities in a way that challenge every colonial ruler or dictator!

This Lent we remember that Jesus is still a challenge to both human authority and individual human beings. He raises this question: what is our response to the challenge to live as members of the Kingdom of God in 2011 - our age with its need and injustice?

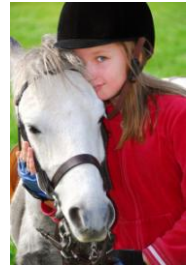

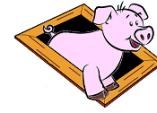
