

From the Vicarage

Dear Friends,

I hope that you were able to enjoy Easter, as we celebrated together the glorious resurrection of Jesus from the dead. I was encouraged by the response to the services we held on Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Sunday, so thank you to all who supported those different occasions.

This month sees a number of other special days in our Christian calendar. Ascension Day, always on a Thursday, is often neglected, but you will see that we have a special service to mark that day, on the 13th at 7.30pm at St. Luke's, Sheen. We are hoping that it will be a service supported by others from the Deanery. There will also be the usual morning service at Newtown, which will be Holy Communion.

Ten days later, is the great feast of Pentecost, or Whitsunday, when we recall how God poured out the Holy Spirit on the early church in a dramatic and life-changing manner. In some places, there was for many years a tradition of a Whit Parade, helped by the fact that the Monday used to be the Bank Holiday. There are no plans for anything like that this year in our churches, but I hope that you will be able to join us at one of the services that day as we give thanks to God for the very important gift of the Holy Spirit, without whom we would not be able to live our Christian lives.

Before either of those special days comes Rogation Sunday, this year on the 9th. This was the traditional time for going out into the fields to pray for a good Harvest. I shall discover later this year how important Harvest Thanksgivings are in this area, but Rogation reminds us that we can pray for the blessing of a good harvest, as well as gather together later in the year to show our

gratitude. A tradition also grew up in some places that Rogation was a time for 'beating the bounds' of the parish; literally walking around the edge of the parish and making sure that everyone knew where their parish ended and another one began. After all, you would not want, for example, the parish of Alstonefield to be claiming jurisdiction over parts of Sheen, or the Bishop of Chester to be enlarging his diocese by absorbing parts of Quarnford! So, in the days before accurate maps began to be produced, the tradition of 'beating the bounds' helped to ensure that everyone knew where traditional boundaries were to be found.

On Rogation Sunday this year we are planning to travel, either on foot or in cars, through the parishes but not round them. (I suspect that would be more than we could manage in a single day's walk!) The walk is not about noting boundaries, but about seeking God's blessing on the land and those who work on it, so we will include occasional stops when we shall pray for God's blessing.

I realise that the proposed walk (printed on a separate page) may look too far for you, but it is broken

down into short sections, and we will be having a brief service in each of the churches that we visit, so there is the opportunity to join us for part of the day. Where practical, we shall be using paths rather than roads, and dogs are welcome, providing they are saintly in behaviour, and know how to pray!

Final details of the route will be available the week before. As always, if you want to know more, please ask.



News from St Bartholomew's School ...

What a wonderful break we had for Easter- although it seems a long time ago now. It seems that Spring has now truly arrived and

summer is rapidly approaching. We all feel better with some sun on our backs.

We started the new term with a Look After me Fortnight. All the school has been working on road safety, the older children following the stepping out programme and the younger ones using the resources from the Road safety team to role play crossing the road in safety.

The children from Flash joined us for the whole day to use the Life Education Bus and take part in a series of activities concerned with keeping safe. Hollinsclough joined us for the afternoon.

1. Honeycomb Centre / Upper Limits

A reply had been received from the owner of the above stating that the buildings have been placed for rental with Butters John Bee and that he would consider selling the buildings at the right price.

2. Christmas Market

The next meeting for the Christmas Market is to be held at the Cheshire Cheese on Thursday, 15th April where costings can be put together so that funding can be sourced and supported via Staffordshire Moorlands Community and Voluntary Services. SMCVS meeting to take place on Thursday, 22nd April.

3. Play Equipment

No update possible - ask Sam Kitchen to speak to Fiona Dunbar to determine if she

wants to come to meeting with Rose Woolley and DO'N regarding funding.

DO'N to approach GP to determine if it is possible to discuss the park funding on 22nd April, 2010. Gaynor has confirmed that it is no problem to discuss the park funding on the 22nd.

4. Market Square

CS advised, at Christmas Market meeting, that a court date has been agreed regarding the Market Square.

5. Village Hall

The biggest issues relating to a village hall were thought to be buying / renting, running costs and cleaning. Concerns were expressed about a village hall detracting from school and also the Church room.

6. Church Clock

A number of villagers have enquired about the village clock - the numbers are very difficult to see and many regard it as a focal point in the village. It needs regilding and possibly cleaning. To regild, clean and make so that it automatically winds is thought to cost in the region of £10,000. The cost was thought to be high but no doubt health and safety / scaffolding etc. makes up a quite a percentage of the cost.

Now James Forrester, the new vicar, is in place it was suggested that discussions took place with him with a view to gaining his opinion and asking whether we can make a joint approach for any grants that might be available for this purpose.

Gaynor started to work with the previous vicar on possible funding for this project & would be happy for James Forrester to make contact if he wishes to take this route.

News From Flash C of E Primary School

Today is a beautiful, sunny, spring day. Such a refreshing change from the long, cold winter days which have seemed endless.



Here at school we have been very busy. We were filmed by the BBC Midlands Today news programme, did you see us? It was a very exciting morning, most of the children experienced being interviewed on camera by James O'Hara. The children asked lots of questions and learnt much about the media process. This has led to us purchasing a state of the art digital video camera which the children have been using to film their own programmes - great fun and superb learning activities too.

We are currently working on enabling every pupil to have their own e-learning area on a learning platform. What is a learning platform, we didn't have one of those when I was at school? Is it a raised decking area? No it's an internet based learning environment where all learners have their own space - it's a way of communicating with staff, parents and pupils. They can create their own e-learning environment, save work, access their homework and check the school calendar. Wow you may say, and I agree it sounds great. It would be, if all of our school community had access to affordable, reliable broadband rather than having to rely upon dodgy dial up connections.

The children have all enjoyed our Easter Activities. We invited parents into school for Easter egg decorating and rolling (which took place inside due to the snow). The morning Easter egg hunt happened on the snowy playground. The 'Easter Bunny' had to be very careful not to leave any prints in the snow when she was hiding the eggs! We raised £30 at our Easter Chocolate Bingo Evening and thanks sincerely go to Mrs Rowena Finney for her bingo calling and everyone who supported us.

All the children performed a street dance with children from St. Bartholomew's at the Leek High School's Gym and Dance Festival. This was enjoyed by all.

Waterhouse's School welcomed us to the small schools swimming gala - again every child participated and many came back clanging because of all the medals around their necks.

We welcomed the new Assistant Director of Education for Staffordshire, Ann Birch. She joined us for lunch and chatted to staff and pupils. I have recently received a lovely thank you letter from Ann.

The pupils in Y5 and Y6 attended the Crucial Crew Event at the Severn Trent Treatment Plant at Tittesworth. They 'visited' lots of different bases and learnt about first aid, gas safety, how dangerous smoking is, what a lorry driver can see from their cab (and what they can't see) and they practised crawling through a 'smoke' filled house during a fire. The children were an absolute pleasure to be with and I was immensely proud of them.

Peak Park Ranger Hazel Winder and Stockport College tutor Paul Devereaux are helping the Key Stage 2 children with

the "Splash Landings" project. Hazel will be looking at the environmental side and Paul is helping with the production of a video documentary. The children will be responsible for the sound track. They will be studying the quality of the water in the River Dove, walking along the banks from its source until they reach Hollinsclough. A bus will take them to Dovedale on another day to look at the river there and to take samples and analyse them. We are hoping that the documentary produced will be entered in a competition run by "saftas" (School Awards for Film in Teaching across Staffordshire).

As another facet on the theme of water, we shall be studying states of matter (gas, liquid and solid) and the solubility of common substances.

Rachel Tate will continue her work on the Inuit people. We will be delighted to welcome pupils from the St Thomas More School who are coming once a fortnight to help the children with a gardening project.

The school obtained the "Good with Outstanding Features" in the Ofsted Report. To look at the complete report, please go to the school website the address of which is shown below.

The premises continue to be upgraded; there are new whiteboards for the Nursery and Key Stage 1. The Early years Play Area is being developed and work on the toilets will commence shortly.

The Film Club has a new projector and screen, but there are no scheduled films during the lighter nights. The school premises and equipment are now available for hire as a conference centre.

We shall be very pleased to welcome the Deputy Director of Education for Staffordshire, Anne Birch, on May 27th. She intends to familiarise herself with the area by visiting all small schools. We shall be sorry to say goodbye to Peter Traves who is retiring as Director of Education. He has been a strong supporter of our plans to cater for home-tutored children.

From the Manse

Dear Friends,

May 24th is Wesley Day and in Buxton we will be having a communion service that even to mark the birthday of John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist Church.

For many young people the name Wesley means nothing. Like the name of Cranmer, to whom we owe the great Prayer Book, he is no longer remembered. Yet, Wesley was an influence not only on his own generations but on those who came later. Arguably, with his brother Charles, he still influences our world.

Today, the world-wide family of Methodists is about the same size as the world-wide Anglican Communion. Its pattern of life and worship is varied. Theologically, it can range from radical and liberal to evangelical and conservative.

So, what holds us together and where does our future lie? Perhaps three of the things which still mark the Methodist Church are these:

- An emphasis on the grace of God in Jesus for all people. John and Charles Wesley were devout Anglican priests when they experienced the grace of God in their lives, a grace which forgave and welcomed and sent them out into the world. They were convinced that what they had known of God's grace was for all and to be shared with all.
- An awareness that the Gospel of grace is a social gospel. John Wesley not only preached about the grace of God as it effects our relationship with God but also the way it transforms the way we see other people and the way we work with others to ensure

that they are valued as individuals and helped in their troubles. For them there was no spiritual righteousness without a commitment to social righteousness.

- A sense that we are movement within the wider church which ought to be prepared to die in order that it may live in new ways.

In England today, I suspect that in many places both Anglican and Methodist Churches are going to have to die in order to be raised by God as new communities for the sake of the villages and towns they seek to serve. The question for the future is going to be more about Christian presence than about whether that presence is Methodist or Anglican.

My own hope is that Anglicans and Methodists may together serve the present age and reveal the Grace of God in Jesus in our land, by their words and deeds.


