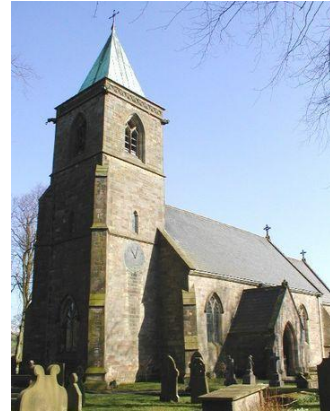

From the Vicarage

Dear Friends,

I am writing this letter before Easter, and then there will be all the excitement (for some people anyway) of the Royal Wedding, so much will have happened before you get a chance to read this. But I hope that you will get it before the 5th May, as I want to encourage you to take very seriously the opportunity to cast your vote that day. It seems likely that there will be elections for various councillors, whether county, district or parish, depending on where you live, but it is certain that, on that day, there will be the referendum on the proposed change to the system of voting in General Elections. Should we, or should we not, change to a new system, that of the Alternative Vote.

I am not going to tell you how I think you should vote on that matter, as I am sure that you will have heard the arguments for and against the change and that you are able to make up your own mind. But I do want to remind you of the great privilege that it is to be able to cast a vote in elections. Even in the history of the early church there is a story about voting, when the decision had to be made about who was going to replace Judas Iscariot in the select band of the 12 Apostles. And while it would hardly be considered a good model of democratic voting, Pilate had allowed the Jewish people to choose between Barabbas or Jesus as the prisoner to be released at the Passover Festival. While the Church of England has yet to adopt voting for its Bishops, the Roman Catholic Cardinals have the privilege of meeting to elect the next Pope, when required. And in our own history, the right to vote has often been something that has been fought for with great passion.

The recent turmoil in some of the Arab states has reminded us that people can feel frustrated when they have no chance to shape the form of government under which they live, and should

encourage us to remember what a privilege it is to be able to register our vote, even if it sometimes seems to be an insignificant thing. I think that it is disappointing when the turn-out at elections is very low, so I encourage you to think of your vote as being a real privilege, and I hope that you will take the opportunity of this referendum and ensure that your opinion is heard.

May is also the month of the season of Rogation, that time when we are encouraged to go out into the fields and look at what is going on, and to pray for the blessing of God upon the work of the local farms. Because of the late date of Easter this year, Rogation Sunday will not be until the 29th May, but we shall still be marking it with a Rogation Walk. As we did last year, we shall be starting the day at Quarnford with a service at 10.00, but the details of where we shall walk after that are still being worked out. Last year we were blessed with a fine day and good fellowship as we walked from Longnor to Newtown to Reapsmoor and on to Sheen, and I hope that you will be able to join us this year as we walk through parts of our parishes and pray together for God's blessing on the work of farmers especially, but also on the work of all who live in this area. Final details of the walking route and the various stopping points will be circulated through the churches in the weeks before the 29th.

The beginning of May is traditionally the time for celebrating the start of summer; we seem already, by the third week of April to have had our share of summer weather, so who knows what May will bring, but I hope that the celebration of Easter, with its message of the victory of God over sin and death will continue to give you joy in this new month.

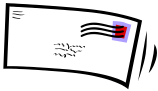

From the Manse

Dear Friends,

A friend is married to the daughter of a well-known, sports journalist. He writes well and he has received many awards for the quality of his writings. Yet, my friend tells me this very capable man always wants to know what he thinks of his articles. Has he read them? Did he agree with what he said?

I have sympathy with that journalist. Occasionally, as I realise that it's time for me to write my next article for the Parish Newsletter, I wonder whether anyone reads it. If they do, then I wonder whether they think it's a load of old rubbish!

We live in an age where communication has become easy. How quickly the world has changed. In 1988 I went to India for the first time and I only made one phone call back to England. I queued for over an hour to speak on the one international line from Calcutta Post Office - and then only got through to our answering machine. The next time I went to India in 1996, there were phone booths which quickly put me through to our home number. In 2003, I just took my mobile phone with me!

Many people communicate by mobile phone, email, Twitter and Facebook. They share the stories and photos of the mundane events of their lives - getting up, breakfasting, reading a book - with anyone who is interested. Yet, at its best, new technology keeps children in touch with their parents, young people in touch with their friends, and provides a

means by which young and old don't need to feel isolated or forgotten.

As with everything, what can be used for good can also be harmful. When I recently went on a Child Protection Course we were told stories of how these new means of communication are being used to bully, spread malicious rumours and belittle other people - sometimes not only through words but also by photograph. Good communication can enrich our lives but it can also be a means of just passing the time, without point and even destructively.

For Christians there is the challenge to communicate well. No one needs to tell me how badly I sometimes communicate the good news of the Gospel, lifeless, boring and irrelevant. Yet, the Christian story, if true, is about life and its purpose, about God's gift of fullness of life the journey towards the fulfilment of our deepest hopes and dreams.

This May is the season of resurrection! It speaks of hopes fulfilled and life transformed. The stories of the risen Jesus communicate the news of life triumphant over death, love offered to all, and the new possibilities which can be ours.

The Church, you and me, has been offered the privilege of living this life, communicating the love God has for all people and being witnesses to the new possibilities God wants people everywhere to enjoy.

But will we?
