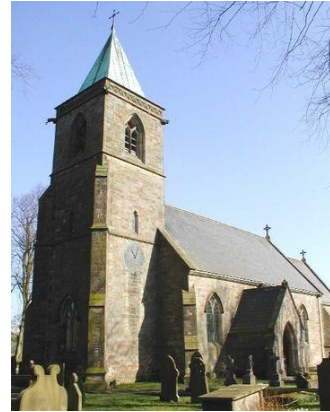

From the Vicarage

Dear Friends,

In my letter last month I talked about the value of looking back at the past with thankfulness, and then looking forward with openness to God. One of the things that can help us in our times of looking back, of recollection, is to have 'holy places'; places that for us have some special significance, perhaps because they are a place where we have met with God in a memorable way. The Bible talks of places like that; Mount Horeb, or Sinai, where Moses was given the Commandments, and where Elijah went when he was feeling threatened and depressed, or Jerusalem, especially the temple.

There also stories of encounters with God for individuals. Think of Jacob, at Bethel, having his dream of the ladder between earth and heaven, or Moses seeing the burning bush in the desert, and so meeting God. As you think of those stories, I wonder if there are there any such places that are special for you and have become your 'holy place'?

In October we had a week's holiday in Somerset, in the Quantock Hills, a place that we have known and loved for many years. In one wooded valley of those hills there is a place that is special for each member of my family, a permanent campsite called *Greatwood*. It has been used as a base for Christian holidays since the 1940's, and I first went to a camp there in 1962. Marion and I first met at one of the camps there, and it was there that our daughter Emma first met her husband. So while we were staying nearby we visited that place again. Much has changed in nearly 50 years. A field that in 1962 contained a selection of surplus World War Two huts and very primitive facilities (Elsan toilets and washing in the stream!) has now got modern en-suite cabins, and very good facilities, but

that does not take away the memories special to that place, times of meeting with God and memories of people who helped me and encouraged me over many years. And partly because of those memories, it remains a place where, for me at least, God seems close at hand. The Celts used to say of the holy island of Iona, 'the air is thin', and just as for them it was easy to meet God there, so it seems for me at *Greatwood*.

For other people, *Greatwood* would not have the same memories, nor be a special place for they do not share the same story. But I hope that if you look back at your story, you have places that remind you of how and when you have met with God. It may be a church, or a spot on a favourite walk, or even a 'holy place' in your home; a quiet corner, a special chair. It is good to have such places as they help to keep us in touch with God.

One of the things that I was taught at *Greatwood* over the years was the value of trying to have a regular time for prayer, perhaps using a reading from the bible to help me focus as I spend time with God. I have learnt over the years that it helps me to have a special place for this, whether it is the same chair, the same corner of a room, or whatever is practical. That can become a 'holy place' for us.

Have you got a 'holy place'? Is there somewhere you could make one? Wherever it may be, I hope that you will set aside time and space to give to meeting with God, and if you would like any advice on using such a time, please ask.

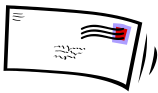

Bonfire Night

After Queen Elizabeth I died in 1603, English Catholics who had been persecuted under her rule had hoped that her successor, James I, would be more tolerant of their religion. James I had, after all, had a Catholic mother. Unfortunately, James did not turn out to be more tolerant than Elizabeth and

a number of young men, 13 to be exact, decided that violent action was the answer.

A small group took shape, under the leadership of Robert Catesby. Catesby felt that violent action was warranted. Indeed, the thing to do was to blow up the Houses of Parliament. In doing so, they would kill the King, maybe even the Prince of Wales, and the Members of Parliament who were making life difficult for the Catholics.

To carry out their plan, the conspirators got hold of 36 barrels of gunpowder - and stored them in a cellar, just under the House of Lords.

But as the group worked on the plot, it became clear that innocent people would be hurt or killed in the attack, including some people who even fought for more rights for Catholics. Some of the plotters started having second thoughts. One of the group members even sent an anonymous letter warning his friend, Lord Monteagle, to stay away from the Parliament on November 5th. The warning letter reached the King, and the King's forces made plans to stop the conspirators.

Guy Fawkes, who was in the cellar of the parliament with the 36 barrels of gunpowder when the authorities stormed it in the early hours of November 5th, was caught, tortured and executed.

It's unclear if the conspirators would ever have been able to pull off their plan to blow up the Parliament even if they had not been betrayed. Some have suggested that the gunpowder itself was so old as to be useless. Since Guy Fawkes and the other conspirators got caught before trying to ignite the powder, we'll never know for certain.

Even for the period which was notoriously unstable, the Gunpowder Plot struck a very profound chord for the people of England. In fact, even today, the reigning monarch only enters the Parliament once a year, on what is called "the State Opening of Parliament". Prior to the Opening, and according to custom, the Yeomen of the Guard search the cellars of the Palace of Westminster. Nowadays, the Queen and Parliament still observe this tradition.

On the very night that the Gunpowder Plot was foiled, on November 5th, 1605, bonfires were set alight to celebrate the safety of the King. Since then, November 5th has become known as Bonfire Night. The event is commemorated every year with fireworks and burning effigies of Guy Fawkes on a bonfire.

I can't believe we're already writing for inclusion in the November magazine! Where did September and October go? This is our first update of the new academic year. All started really well with no tears from nursery and reception, and good reports from the children who transferred to the Middle school. Everyone else has settled into their classes really well and are working hard on our autumn and weather topics. Remembrance and Christmas will be our topics for the next couple of months!

The children are continuing to meet with Flash school for our PE lessons and we have other joint activities planned with a science visit to leek high and a trip to the panto in December. We are also hoping to be working with other schools in the cluster to develop more links with our twinned schools in Kenya and I shall be hoping to deliver letters and good wishes personally when I join a group of teachers from around the Diocese to travel out in February. We have also arranged joint training culminating in a global awareness activity for pupils later in the year.

The children enjoyed taking their baskets around the village and were greeted with smiles and thankyou's. Thank you to the people who also sent thank you cards- these are invaluable lessons for the children.

Our two after school clubs have been well supported this term. The 'let's get cooking club' has been turning out fabulous

scones, pizzas and puddings so far- some budding chefs in the making! We also have some budding clowns (as if we didn't already know it!) as our circus skills club goes from strength to strength, spinning plates, juggling, tight rope and stilt walking etc. All in a days work for a busy primary teacher!

As you read this we will be starting rehearsals for our Christmas play- an adaptation of Dicken's Christmas Carol - but with a twist of course. We are hoping to have a 'taster' ready for the Victorian market.

Please note our new takeaway food venture. Our cook Vickie makes exceedingly good dinners-try them! As well as the takeaway menu there will be special themed days to which everyone is very welcome.
