

Worship Leader's Letter

I am a great hoarder. I cut interesting bits out of newspapers, magazines, leaflets, etc. and carefully store them away - often in places where I will be unlikely ever to find them again! Occasionally, these words of interest and wisdom come to the surface and I re-read them. One cutting is by the former Bishop of Lichfield, Bishop Keith

"In my opinion, one of the deepest problems for all our churches today is simply this - how do we enable men and women to truly believe in God? In many parishes within our diocese of Lichfield there is much strong fellowship, much dedicated service, much committed leadership and sacrifice from both clergy and laity. Yet the wider situation remains uncertain.

The same is true for many church people. I often tell the story of an Anglican member of a South London church who, over a two or three year period, regularly pushed the church magazine through the letter box of a large house near her parish church. One day the man of the house, whom she had never seen, came to the door and thanked her for delivering it. He then told her that he had three serious questions about God and would be grateful for help on them. The lady felt some confusion and immediately found herself replying 'I'm terribly sorry but we are not very good on God at St. Mary's.'

I recognise myself in that story. For me, incomparably the most disturbing experience during my first two years as Bishop of Lichfield was the searing difficulty, during a teaching mission in Tettenhall Wood, of speaking about trust in God to groups of Midlands people alienated by honest doubt from the

experience of faith. As we begin another autumn's work, I would encourage everyone to grapple continuously with this challenge. We have an overriding duty to do so."

Part of another cutting (author unknown)
"One of the lessons I learned early in life was the importance of saying 'thank you'. Although I'm sure I did not always respond with a glad and generous heart, I am pleased that I was taught a fundamental courtesy.

But thank-you's are not just reserved for childhood, of course. We find ourselves using the phrase on all manner of occasions, and there are many situations when 'thank—you' is the only appropriate response, and maybe is all that can be said. But in saying that one phrase we are saying a great deal more besides. A key element in both the Old and New Testaments of the Bible is Thanksgiving. In the bad and difficult times when God's people found themselves up against it; when they thought God had forsaken them; when they themselves had more often than not forgotten and forsaken God; just as much as in the good, positive and harmonious times, there is always the theme of Thanksgiving to God.

At the end of our first month without a vicar, may I say 'thank you' for the encouragement I have received from the Benefice. As I said in the September magazine, mistakes will be made, there will have to be some changes in service times, but let us continue to work together.

Whatever we do, in word or in deed, let us do everything in the name of Jesus, giving thanks to God our Father through Him.

Your Rural Police News

I have kindly been invited to pass on details of local Policing through the newsletter.

In this edition I want to tell you a little about your neighbourhood Policing team and the various ways you can get in touch. There is also some crime prevention information which may be of interest.

I am PC Andy Beresford and have worked the rural section for over two years but have twenty years wide and varied Policing experience. Having been born and raised in a farming family in the small village of Ramshorn, (near to Oakamoor) I have a good understanding of country life, relevant issues and what warm and friendly people live in these parts. It is a genuine pleasure to be serving where my roots are.

Including myself there are three full time officers based at Waterhouses and between us we cover a large geographical area including the villages reached by this newsletter. We are keen to listen to the matters that concern you the most so our priorities can reflect yours and our resources can be targeted most effectively.

In this area we benefit from a low crime rate and this is due in no small part to the strong sense of community that still exists. However, we should never become complacent and do whatever is possible to keep our property secure. At the moment we are seeing a rise in the theft of metal and fuel (including heating oils) due in part to the increasing value of these goods. It would be wise to review your security arrangements in general but in particular if you have either of these commodities.

We can arrange a visit from one of our crime prevention officers who offer a free and independent review of your current home or business security. You can then choose to implement whichever of the recommendations you wish. This can range from state of the art CCTV and alarm systems to suggestions which will cost nothing.

As part of the Neighbourhood Watch scheme we offer a 'watch-out' service which is an easy to understand computerised telephone information system and is completely free. It rings your home or mobile phone at a time convenient to you and gives a recorded message detailing crime which has occurred in your area so you can be on your guard and help prevent it happening to you or your neighbours. For more information about this service or to subscribe to it collect a simple to fill-out leaflet from a local Police station or from the village shops in Butterton and Hulme End. There are also other crime prevention materials available at these locations.

If you need any further advice on any Policing issues contact me or either of my colleagues at Waterhouses; Pc Brian Millward and PCSO Paul Flowers.

For non-emergency matters contact us on 08453 30 20 10 quoting a name to the operator.

If we're not in the office please leave us a voicemail message. I check mine every duty day.

You can also email me on andrew.beresford@staffordshire.pnn.police.uk

In the event of an emergency you should always ring 999 and even if there are no Waterhouses officers available there is continual 24/7 cover from one of our neighbouring stations.



Everybody is settled in and we are pleased to welcome 7 new pupils this term. The term got off to a cracking start with Longnor and Flash School enjoying a

Box Office Opens for Chitty Chitty Bang Bang

Longnor Players are now selling tickets for their forthcoming production, 'Chitty Chitty



Bang Bang', to be performed this half term at Manifold School, 7.15pm Thursday 30th and Friday 31st October and Saturday 1st November, with a matinee at 2.15pm on the Saturday. This version of 'Chitty Chitty Bang Bang' has been specially adapted by Lizzie Nicholls in Longnor and will feature all the familiar characters from the 1968 film, including Caractacus Potts, Jeremy and Jemima, Truly Scrumptious, the Child Catcher and Baron and Baroness Bonhurst. It is a story of love and adventure, of good and evil and of a family in search of something missing - all brought together by a fantasmagorical car!

The special character of Longnor Players' productions is that they include adults and children of all ages in the production and aim to involve the whole community. This show is no exception, being the local group's largest and most ambitious project. This is a full scale musical with an enormous cast, fantastic dancing and superb props, including the stunning car.

Although the book by Ian Fleming was published 44 years ago, the story is best known as the 1968 film starring Dick Van Dyke, with a screen play written by Roald Dahl. We are very fortunate to have a short run by Longnor Players this autumn and it is expected that tickets will sell fast. 

From the Manse

Dear Friends,

The world is changing so fast - banks collapsing, being nationalised and taken over - that I don't know what will have happened by the time you read this.

Many people are speaking of the almost incredible arrogance, greed and folly which lay behind the near-collapse of the banking system. We can point to bankers, to politicians and to regulators, but we know that we also have to point at ourselves. We have been ready to believe that the good times would last for ever, that people would always be able to afford their ever-growing mortgage repayments, that the billions of pounds paid in bonuses to those who took ever greater risks in their lending, was money well spent.

Already, many ordinary people have lost their jobs and many more undoubtedly will. In America, others have lost their homes and there are fears for some in this country. The consequences of these last weeks for the British economy are uncertain but few doubt that there will be painful consequences for both household incomes and employment.

So where is God in all this?

1. Christians may recognise we are living with what Paul calls "God's wrath". It's an unfortunate term (because of the way we usually use that word) but when Paul uses it he doesn't mean personal anger but the impersonal outcome of our folly and our disobedience to God, the very things we recognise at the heart of our current crisis.

The homeless and the unemployed are already a sign of the consequences of what happens when we go against God's will. No doubt, in the coming months, we will all experience God's "wrath" in one form or

another. It won't be God being angry with us but God allowing the natural and inevitable outcome of our human folly to take place.

2. Yet, deep in our Jewish/Christian tradition there is the belief that God is not only a God of "wrath" but also a God of mercy. The story of Jonah tells us of how he sulked when God refused to destroy the great city of Nineveh after the city repented. Jonah complains bitterly, "*I knew that you are a gracious God and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and ready to relent from punishing.*" God does not treat us as we deserve. When we admit that we have screwed up on the past but now seek to put right what is wrong, we find that he is the God who is waiting to show us mercy. Through his mercy, we do not suffer the full consequences of our actions and find in him a source of hope.

3. So, is there a place of security when the world is shaken? Long ago the Psalmist wrote:

*God is our refuge and strength:
a very present help in time of
trouble.*

*Therefore we will not fear though
the earth be moved
and though the mountains are
shaken in the midst of the sea.*

(Psalm 46)

God gives us our ultimate security because he draws us into his eternal being. Yet, he is also the God who enables us to shape the future, to help those who are in trouble because of the turmoil that has engulfed them, and to work for a more just and sustainable future for all. The future is not closed but, by God's mercy, full of potential!

So, Christ's peace be with you and me in troubled times!
